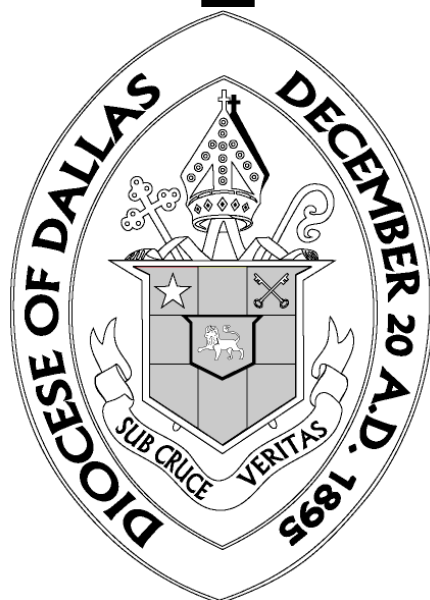

PROCEEDINGS OF THE 124TH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF DALLAS

The Rt. Rev. George R. Sumner, Bishop of Dallas, served as Chair of the Convention and called the Convention to order.

Bishop Sumner welcomed Mr. David Monaco, head of Parish Episcopal School, to the dais to offer words of welcome.

Bishop Sumner thanked the Very Rev. Dr. Leander Harding, Dean of All Saints Cathedral, Albany, New York, for his teaching at the Pre-Convention Leadership Day held the day before at St. Matthew's Cathedral, Dallas. He also thanked the Rt. Rev. Todd McGregor and the Rev. Patsy McGregor who both participated in the Pre-Convention Leadership day and preached at the morning Eucharist.

The Chair then moved to the first action of the Convention which was welcoming St. Philip's Sudanese, Dallas as a new Mission of the Diocese. Bp. Sumner welcomed members of that congregation along with their vicar, The Rev. Deng Pager, to the front to share songs of praise with the Convention. Fr. Pager also offered words of welcome and thanks to God and to the Diocese.

The Chair thanked the Daughters of the King and the Harvest Intercessory Prayer team for praying for the Convention throughout the day.

The Chair recognized the volunteers from Parish Episcopal School, who served as pages for the Convention as well as those volunteers serving as Sergeants-at-Arms. Finally, Bp. Sumner called attention to the envelopes on each table for every parish/mission containing Christian Formation materials assembled by the Rev. Canon Jordan Hylden.

The Chair then called on Mrs. Jolayne LaCour, Chair of the Credentials Committee, to come to the dais for the purpose of giving a report on credentials.

Mrs. LaCour gave the following credentials report:

116 Registered to Vote	178 Lay Delegates representing 59 Parishes and Missions registered

The report was adopted by voice vote, and the Chair declared a quorum present.

The Bishop recognized the Rev. Canon Michael Gilton, Chair of the Committee on Dispatch of Business, who presented the *Rules of Procedure for the Annual Convention* of the Diocese of Dallas as distributed. He referred delegates to the entire list of rules beginning on page 10 of the Convention Booklet.

Canon Gilton highlighted a few of the more pertinent rules including the proper way to address the Bishop, a description of microphone usage during debate, the time limit on remarks, requirements for changes to the budget, regulations for leaving the convention floor during voting, a request to turn off or mute all cell phones, and the prohibition of demonstrations of emotion. Canon Gilton moved that the Rules of Procedure be adopted. The Chair asked delegates to stand to show approval on the adoption of the Rules of Procedure. The motion was approved with more than two-thirds of delegates standing, and the rules were adopted as follows.

RULES OF PROCEDURE FOR THE ANNUAL CONVENTION

Presiding Officer

1. The Bishop or such other person as provided in the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese shall serve as presiding officer. The presiding officer may call to the chair any qualified person to relieve him temporarily. The presiding officer shall have full power and authority to take such action (consistent with the Constitution

and Canons) as he deems necessary to expedite the orderly disposition of the business of the Convention.

2. After the Convention is called to order by the presiding officer, an opening prayer shall be offered by the presiding officer or someone designated by him.

3. The presiding officer shall have the authority to appoint a parliamentarian of his own choice to advise him on parliamentary questions arising during the Convention.

4. Any person addressing the chair or desiring recognition of the chair while the Convention is in session shall address the chair as “Right Reverend Sir” if the Bishop is in the chair. If some other person is in the chair, he shall be addressed as “Mister/Madam President.”

Committees

5. In addition to the Nominating Committee provided for elsewhere in these Rules, the Ecclesiastical Authority, within a reasonable length of time before the convening of the Annual Convention, may appoint from among the officers and staff of the Diocese, the delegates of the Convention and such other confirmed persons in good standing as the Ecclesiastical Authority may designate, the following committees:

- Arrangements
- Credentials
- Dispatch of Business
- Constitution and Canons
- Elections

Each committee shall consist of a chair and such other members as the Ecclesiastical Authority may determine. Each committee shall perform such duties as may be deemed necessary or advisable to facilitate the business of the Convention and any specific duties assigned to such committee by the presiding officer or under the Constitution and Canons or these Rules. Members of these committees shall continue in office until their respective successors are appointed.

Order of Business

6. The order of business to be presented to the Convention for adoption shall be established by the presiding officer in accordance with the Constitution and Canons.

7. Any item of business of the Convention may be set as a special order of business or taken up out of its regular order at any time by a two-thirds vote of the delegates. Subject to the foregoing, the presiding officer shall have the authority, within his discretion, to deviate from the order of business adopted, as the exigencies of the occasion may require.

8. After being organized and ready to proceed to business, the first order of business shall be the election of a Secretary and one or more Assistant Secretaries, if needed.

9. All Resolutions of Substance (thus exempting Resolutions of Courtesy) shall be submitted to the Secretary of Convention no later than 10:00 in the morning of the first regular business day. Such resolutions shall be submitted in writing (a) with enough printed copies for distribution to all voting delegates and (b) in electronic form, on a portable memory device. If the resolutions mention outside data, resolutions, etc., copies of such material shall be made available to those requesting same. Such resolutions shall be referred by the presiding officer to the Committee on Dispatch of Business. The Committee shall give due and timely consideration to such resolutions and reports and, with reasonable dispatch, make its report thereon back to the Convention with its recommendation for final disposition on any such resolution or report.

Conduct of Business

10. A delegate desiring recognition of the Chair shall give his/her name and the name of the church he/she represents.

11. A delegate may use the microphone on the stage of the Convention only with the permission of the presiding officer.

12. A delegate making a report or debating shall go to the designated microphone. At the discretion of the presiding officer, microphones may be designated “pro” and “con” to expedite debate. A third microphone may be utilized for procedural motions and questions.

13. To expedite the business of the Convention, debates on any pending resolution or motion shall be limited to three minutes per speaker, and one person shall not speak more than once on the pending matter until all other persons who so desire have had an opportunity to be heard. No member shall speak more than two times to any one motion. The number of speakers for discussion shall be divided, as near as is practical, equally between the proponents and opponents of the pending subject.

14. A question having been decided shall not be reconsidered at the same Convention without the consent of two-thirds of the members present, nor without a motion for that purpose being made by one of the majority on the prior decision. No question shall be reconsidered more than once.

15. If required by the presiding officer, any motion shall not be considered as before the Convention unless reduced to writing.

16. When any proposed amendment to the Constitution or Canons is before the Convention, amendments thereto may be sent up from the floor if, within the judgment of the presiding officer, such floor amendments are germane to the pending amendments and do not change the purpose of such pending amendments.

17. When consideration of the proposed Diocesan Budget is before the Convention, (a) each amendment thereto must indicate the specific line item(s) being increased and/or decreased, and (b) the aggregate dollar amount of changes proposed must be offsetting.

Reports

18. All reports, which have been printed and distributed in advance to all members of the Convention, shall be presented by title only and not read; however, any person presenting such a report may give a summary of it requiring not more than five minutes delivery.

19. The budget materials prepared for Convention shall include both descriptions of line items and rationale for changes in funding or deletions of line items from the budget of the previous year.

Nominations

20. The Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint, not less than 60 days in advance of each Annual Convention, a Nominating Committee composed of four clergy and four lay persons resident in the Diocese, which shall report to the Convention nominations for all elective offices (other than those for which the bishop makes the nominations) in accordance with the following provisions:

- (a) Except as to the Office of Secretary, Trustee of the University of the South, and President of the Disciplinary Board, there shall be nominated not less than two nominees for each office.
- (b) There shall be obtained from each nominee presented his/her personal assurance of his/her willingness and availability to serve, if elected.
- (c) The name of each nominee shall be accompanied by suitable brief biographical data, including a listing of parish, mission, and diocesan offices then and previously held.
- (d) Suggestions as to persons for consideration shall be sought from parishes, missions, and diocesan institutions, and from individuals.
- (e) Further nominations for any office may be made on or before the first regular business day of Convention. All such nominations must be submitted in writing on the prescribed nomination form to the Secretary of the Convention no later than the call to order of the first business session of the Convention; and accompanied by the copies of the biographical information required in sections (b) and (c) above with a sufficient number of nomination forms and biographical sheets for delivery equal to all lay and clerical Convention Delegates; and accompanied by the signatures of the nominator and the nominee. The Secretary of the Convention shall certify that any nominations so received are in good order and satisfy the requirements set forth in sections (b) and (c) above. After the Nominating Committee makes its report for each office to be elected, in succession, the Secretary of the Convention shall announce the names of the additional nominees for the same offices whose names have been placed in nomination according to the provisions of this rule and shall distribute the nomination forms and biographical information on those so certified to all Convention Delegates. No seconding speeches or endorsements of any candidate shall be allowed. Nominations made according to the provisions of this rule shall be added to the election ballots of delegates according to the direction of the Chair of the Elections Committee and thus eligible for

election as the vote for each office proceeds. A nominee (or in his absence at the Convention, the Rector of the nominee's Parish) may withdraw his name from consideration at any time.

Voting and Elections

21. When two or more equal positions are voted on simultaneously, a nominee must receive a majority of the total number of legal votes cast for such office. In the event a majority is received by more candidates than there are positions to be filled, those with the highest legal vote totals shall be elected.
22. In the election of persons wherein a concurring majority of both orders is required, in which only the number of persons required to fill the position or positions under consideration have been nominated, the Bishop, by unanimous consent of the Convention, may declare the candidates elected.
23. The Ecclesiastical Authority shall have the authority to appoint all Board Members, Trustees, and Committee Members, and fill other positions which are not required to be elected or otherwise selected by the Constitution or Canons of the Diocese of Dallas or any other lawful authority.
24. Voting will be conducted in accordance with the following procedures:
 - (a) At the time of registration, each delegate shall be issued: (i) a yellow voting card to each lay delegate and a blue voting card to each member of the clergy and (ii) a yellow keypad card to each lay delegate and a blue keypad card to each member of the clergy.
 - (b) Lay delegates and members of the clergy shall enter the Convention floor through doors marked "clergy" and "lay," respectively. Upon entrance to the Convention floor for business sessions, each delegate will exchange his keypad card for a voting keypad.
 - (c) If a delegate loses a voting card or keypad card, he must return to the registration desk for replacement.
 - (d) When directed by the presiding officer, a delegate shall vote by either (i) using the keypad or (ii) raising a voting card, as directed by the presiding officer.
 - (e) Doors shall be closed during voting and entry to the Convention floor shall be denied until ballots are collected, or, if not a ballot vote, until the results of the vote are announced.
 - (f) Upon exiting the Convention floor, each delegate will exit only through the designated door and shall exchange his/her keypad for a keypad card.
 - (g) In case of a malfunction of electronic voting equipment, the presiding officer shall establish procedures for voting by paper ballot or other means.
 - (h) If deemed appropriate by the presiding officer, the presiding officer shall appoint a sufficient number of tellers to count voting cards raised on any vote.
 - (i) Elections shall be conducted under the oversight of the Elections Committee, and the presiding officer may delegate authority to establish additional voting procedures to such committee.

Miscellaneous

25. The presiding officer, or such person as he may designate, shall be in charge of the admission of all media personnel to the Convention floor, and no TV or video cameras shall be permitted on the floor without the prior approval of the presiding officer.
26. No literature shall be distributed at the Convention, on the floor or on the premises, without prior approval of the presiding officer.
27. The audible use of cell phones and other personal accessories shall not be permitted during sessions of the Convention.
28. The proceedings of the Convention shall be tape recorded and permanently filed. The Journal of the Convention shall be reviewed and approved by a committee consisting of the Secretary, the Chancellor and the Parliamentarian.
29. Any of these rules may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of the delegates. These rules may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the delegates, provided such amendments are not in violation of the Constitution or Canons of the Diocese.
30. The Constitutions and Canons Committee shall be authorized to correct article, canon, and section designations, numbering, grammar, punctuation and cross-references and to make such other technical, typographical and conforming changes that will not change the meaning or intent of an amendment or

resolution as may be necessary to reflect the intent of the Convention in approving the amendment or resolution.

31. The Rules of Procedure of the previous meeting of Convention shall be in force until they are amended or repealed.

With the adoption of the three reports (Credentials, Rules of Procedure, and Order of Business), the Chair announced that the convention was duly organized and ready for the transaction of business.

The Chair recognized the Rev. Perry Mullins, Chair of the Nominating Committee, who offered the first report of the Nominating Committee with the nomination of Mr. Bob Buchanan for the office of Secretary of Convention. The Chair asked if there were nominations from the floor. Seeing none, he called for a vote. Mr. Buchanan was elected by voice vote.

The Chair nominated Mr. David Parsons to be Chancellor of the Diocese. Mr. Parsons was elected by a voice vote to a one-year term.

The Chair announced that Mrs. Mary Sonom will remain as Treasurer of the Diocese.

124th Annual Meeting of the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas
November 2, 2019

The Chair appointed Mrs. Ellen Williamson as Parliamentarian for the Convention.

* * *

The Chair recognized Mr. Bob Buchanan, Secretary of the Convention. Mr. Buchanan noted that the minutes of the 123rd Annual Diocesan Convention held in 2018 had been previously approved by a committee consisting of Mr. Bob Buchanan, the previous year's Secretary to Convention; Mr. David Parsons, the Chancellor; and Ms. Kay Crews, the Parliamentarian. The minutes were posted on the Diocesan website. The Chair thanked the committee and then asked the convention body if there were any objections to the Secretary of Convention, the Chancellor, and the Parliamentarian serving as the body that approved of the minutes for the 124th Annual Diocesan Convention held in 2019. Hearing no objection, the committee was approved.

* * *

The Chair moved a suspension of rules in order to approve licensed clergy (those who served in churches in this Diocese but who were not canonically resident) to sit with their congregations' delegations and to allow them to have voice, but no vote. This action required a two-thirds vote. The Chair noted that the ruling applied to:

Tim Kennedy, Saint Michael and All Angels, Dallas; the Rt. Rev. Fraser Lawton, St. Dunstan's, Mineola; the Rev. Eric Liles, Saint Michael and All Angels, Dallas; the Rev. Leo Loyola, St. Thomas the Apostle, Dallas; the Rev. Jonathan Melton, Holy Trinity, Heath; the Rev. Dr. Hiltrude Nusser-Telfer, Saint Michael and All Angels, Dallas; the Rev. Terence Roper, Transfiguration, Dallas; the Rev. Robert Scott, Saint Michael and All Angels, Dallas; and the Rev. Jonathan Totty, Annunciation, Lewisville.

The convention approved the seating of licensed clergy without objection.

* * *

The Chair then called upon the Rev. Canon Michael Gilton, Canon to the Ordinary, to report on clergy changes within the Diocese.

Clergy Changes

The Chair gave notice that one congregation has requested to be dissolved under the provision of Canon 19.1 – All Saints, Atlanta. The chair announced that he had accepted their request and no further action was required because the request was voluntary.

The Chair then reported on the six mission stations of the diocese: The Gathering, Dallas; Holy Faith, Dallas; San Marcos, Mt. Pleasant; St. Francis, Winnsboro; St. Justin Martyr, Canton; and a new mission station called Grace Community under the leadership of the Rev. Samira Izadi Page, which is comprised primarily of Farsi speakers.

The Chair asked the Rev. D. J. Griffin and the Rev. George Joseph to introduce a special guest to Convention, The Rev. Dr. Ninan Verghese, Priest-in-Charge of the Church of South India of Dallas. The Rev. Dr. Verghese then addressed the Convention and shared about the ministry and challenges of the Church of South India. Bishop Sumner thanked the Rev. Dr. Verghese for his presence and led the Convention in prayer

The Chair then recognized the Assistant Bishop, the Rt. Rev. Michael Smith, to share on his work with the Communion Partners. Bp. Smith thanked the Diocese for their warm welcome as well as the opportunity to share on the history and work of the Communion Partners.

The Chair, the Rt. Rev. Dr. George R. Sumner, Bishop of Dallas, offered his address. He preceded his address with words of thanks for the staff of the Diocese, Bob Buchanan, Ellen Williamson, Mary Sonom, David Parsons, and Canon Michael Gilton. He also thanked the Demlers and the Convention Arrangements Committee for their work in preparing for Convention. In addition, he recognized those in attendance who worked with entities outside the Diocese: the Rev. Matthew Olver, Fred Ellis, the Rev. Canon Jordan Hylden, and Christopher Wells. Finally, he noted all the bishops in attendance at Convention, including the Rt. Rev. Michael Smith, assistant Bishop of the Diocese and the Rt. Rev. Fraser Lawton, the new assisting Bishop of the Diocese and rector of St. Dunstan's, Mineola.

Address to the 124th Annual Convention
The Rt. Rev. George R. Sumner, Bishop, Diocese of Dallas

In the name of God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, Amen. I want to start this morning with Ralph. He was a stalwart parishioner of mine at Trinity Church, Geneva, New York. He was a dignified retired banker and the husband of my senior warden. He served the parish in every way you could. I remember him best in a three-piece suit seated on a chair meant for a first grader reading Dr. Seuss to a child in our program in the nearby elementary school. In year four as rector I was travelling for my second time through the three-year lectionary, and Ralph had the added duty of telling me, when I would call him Thursday night, whether he had heard the story before which I was about to open the sermon with. (And mind you that was twenty-five years ago!) Sometimes yes, sometimes no, sometimes yes but they won't remember it, sometimes yes and it's actually

worth a rerun! I am now in my fifth year as the Bishop of Dallas, and the only person to say if the story is a repeat is Stephanie, and she has heard all of them before! Maybe when everyone has heard all your stories, it is a criterion for clergy retirement! I say this because I want to review a guiding principle for us in the bishop's office over these past four years. Executive Council – you have heard this story before, but many of you haven't.

The primary reality for most lay people is their local parish, hearing the Word, celebrating the sacraments, serving, and having fellowship. These are the things that are most real on the ground. Christianity is embodied, person to person, word from mouth to ear, bread from hand to mouth, ensouled bodies sitting side by side in the pew, this alone in fact makes it a radical social institution in our time. The parish is the central unit for the people of God's experience. To be sure, this sometimes melds together with the natural individualism of us moderns, as we heard yesterday, and us Americans, and it can sometimes be myopic, but it is mostly a good thing. It remains true theologically that the central unit of the Church is the diocese, but that doesn't ring a bell for many Christians. We have, therefore, here tried to think through the work of a diocese in a deliberately parish-based perspective. If you do that, what follows? The diocese should be lean, although I hope not too mean. It should be pragmatic about the resources it offers and whether they are really helpful. It should promote parish to parish support whenever possible. But all of this raises an immediate, and for me urgent, question: what then is a bishop in particular for? He or she should offer answers to three questions that a reflective parish should ask: Where did my priest come from? Who started this place? And why are we called the 'Episcopal Church'? In answer to question one, a bishop legitimately ordains, supports the ordained. In answer to question two, the bishop encourages planting and rebooting of congregations, just as our forebear Bishop Garrett so dramatically did. And third of all, a bishop is to remind parishes that in fact they are not islands, but part of something vast and ancient and connected, a Body whose organs must recognize one another in order to survive, as St. Paul said. And that third reason, the Church being apostolic and catholic, is no less necessary for being against the cultural and experiential grain.

Our theme for this convention is similarly against the grain. It is a quotation from John Wesley, curmudgeon Anglican priest, the first Methodist, and the inventor of the small group. He said "the world is my parish." It is dramatic and stirring, which is why we chose it, but how does it make a difference in our lives? I want to offer three things it could mean. First of all, at the most straightforward level, it exhorts us to remember that we are our brother or sister's keeper. We need to look out further, every one of us individually and as congregations, further than we are accustomed; this is where that bumper sticker "think globally act locally" is headed. In doing so we reach beyond our immediate circle, indeed beyond the community of the Church. The whole world belongs to God – He made it – though the world does not acknowledge Him, and so His world has to be the scope of our ministries as His servants. There are so many ways in which congregations in this diocese are already engaged in this. You can go to one place in our Diocese and find a clinic particularly supporting undocumented people and their health needs; you can find in another parish a drive to fight human trafficking, elsewhere tutoring, in several places a vegetable truck or a food truck, you can find outreach to traumatized veterans, and on and on. And part of the privilege of my ministry is to travel around and see these week by week. The Church is meant to be eccentric, by which I mean facing outward (not just odd!), because the world in its confusion still belongs to God.

But we need to go a step further in our exegesis of Wesley's soundbite. And so secondly, we are also a part of the "one great fellowship of love throughout the whole wide world." The Communion of which we are a part comprises virtually every corner of that world. As a Church, secondly, we must say that "the world is our parish." This day, we have offered as speakers and our program is meant to underline this fact. A fact which gives depth to the words each of us say when we stand in church and recite the creed that we are part of a church which is "one, holy, catholic, and apostolic." That word catholic literally means "of the whole," and the global nature of the Church, that it is comprehensive across the continents, can be one sense of that word. The Anglican Communion means that we are a Church catholic not only in hope but in actual Eucharistic fellowship.

This past Lent I enjoyed having a chance to review the remarkable history of the birth and growth of our own global Communion in a Lenten series at Annunciation, Lewisville. I was reminded how seeming accidents, surprises, and mistakes on the part of the missionaries as well as the colonialists, and most importantly the ingenuity of local Christians led to the flourishing of Churches throughout the world in ways that the planters never imagined. The Melanesian brotherhood, the Mother's Union, the east African revival, the mass movements of untouchables in India, the underground Chinese Church: in each case the Spirit moved among lay people who heard the Gospel and expressed it in forms appropriate to their surroundings. Providentially an Anglican global branch of the Church catholic came into being, and most of it was not the fruit of any diocesan planning or any clerical directive.

I hope that, in our parish projects which I hear about and I admire as we work from parishes going throughout the world to serve, I hope that we will all make an effort to make contact with our fellow Anglicans in those places as part of that work. We already have a close relation with Honduras, and we all know our friend bishop Lloyd Allen. And that relationship is a paradigm of how helping and fellowship can give depth to Wesley's vision. Such friendships give substance, as I say, to the words "one, holy, catholic, and apostolic." To this end, we continue to invite a leader of a Church in the Communion to each of our Conventions. We have been delighted to have the McGregors with us – Todd and Patsy – their preaching and teaching an example has been extraordinary. We are delighted to welcome this morning our fellow Christians in the Anglican Communion in the Church of South India. But we have more guests as well. In January, Bishop Joseph Wandera of Western Kenya will be with us, and at Holy Week, the archbishop of Burundi, Martin Nyaboho, will be celebrant and preacher. (Sign up for him; his slate of schedules is not yet full.) We are also looking forward, in the year 2020, to placing a curate as a theological teacher in St. Frumentius Theological College, a seminary in southwest Ethiopia, part of the Church of Egypt in the Horn of Africa, a place where there is a considerable ministry among Sudanese refugees. And one of the conditions of that placement is that he write an epistle back to us every week, in the style of an earlier era of the church, so that we can have a sense of what his ministry and fellowship to us is like.

I want to offer a personal aside here. I have had the privilege of being part of the planning of the next Lambeth Conference over the last couple of years. Lambeth Conference is the gathering of all the bishops of the Communion every ten years or so. The tag line for that meeting, "God's Church for God's World," tracks Wesley's vision as well. And that group has felt the gale force winds of Anglican politics. Just the same, there remains a majority of the Communion's bishops who share what I would call an "irenicly traditional" view, which defends the traditional teaching but wants to remain in as much communion as possible and wants to strengthen the means of our common life. And we believe that a similar number of bishops, to what Bishop Smith mentioned, will be in attendance. You can readily see how support of such a conference touches our own ministry, which means to offer to our own Churches a distinctive, globally recognizable, and traditional witness. Several Archbishops of Canterbury over the last fifty years have exhorted bishops to "bring their dioceses" to Lambeth, in the sense of informing and engaging them concerning the issues and themes that will come up before the bishops in July of 2020. I aim to send each congregation a letter this winter which will contribute to this and ask each congregation to engage in that letter and its suggestions in some way.

A diocesan address needs a word of Scripture, and I have chosen the opening verse from the first letter of Peter, which is also the text of the Lambeth Conference. It goes like this: "Peter, an apostle of Jesus Christ, to the strangers scattered through Pontus, Galatia, Cappadocia, Asia, and Bithynia."

Peter recognizes that the Christians of Asia Minor are literally "the dispersion," living in a midst of a people who do not share their beliefs or worldview, amidst perspectives sometimes hostile to the Gospel, balkanized cities for which "the world is not their parish." But they, say Peter, are one people, God's people, the new Israel, though they live in a scattered exile. They are from many nations, yet one body in Jesus Christ, scattered not only in suffering but also simultaneously in evangelistic providential opportunity among their neighbors, so that, as Peter says in Chapter 3, they might offer "a reason for the hope that is in them." These verses go straight to the heart of our own situation here today.

“We who are many are one body, for we all share in the one bread,” as the Eucharist reminds us every Sunday; and likewise the Anglican Communion is the profound yet immediate concrete way in which “the world is our parish” indeed. Being one, holy, catholic, and apostolic is tangible in our lives together as believers are tangible one to another, and the Communion is in fact present yet more close to home. Philip Jenkins, a historian of mission down in Baylor, wrote a famous book a decade ago called *The Next Christendom*, and his point was that the globe had come home, had come to all of our own North American cities. In our own diocese, we have congregations which are in large measure Iraqi, Nepali, Sudanese, Nigerian, and El Salvadoran. North Texas is diverse, and so are we. And as we this morning celebrate St. Philip’s Sudanese Mission, we are celebrating the Pentecost-like nature of the Church.

My point is this: we need to connect to what we think outreach is to what we think communion is and hold them together. Our calling as Christians to the world includes outreach to the world in its trouble and suffering, but it also involves witnessing to our oneness in this divided and angry day and angry world as we show our oneness as well.

Furthermore “the world is our parish” has to do with Christians who are in other denominations, as we have already seen this morning. I am encouraged and upheld by the fellowship of pastors called the “South Dallas Coalition,” in which Carrie Headington has such a leadership role. The group has strengthened bonds of fellowship among pastors between predominantly black and white churches, not politically, but because we share the Gospel. Out of this koinonia have emerged ministries to young people, open table groups, ways to help the post-incarcerated, guidance in our conversations about racial reconciliation, and other things too. There are so many examples in this diocese: Incarnation’s friendship with Roseland Partners, St. Anne’s, Desoto encouraging Canterbury School adoption by the Baptist Church, and many more.

I promised three senses of “the world is my parish”, so what’s number three? This one is a reach. I don’t remember much of my Hebrew course in seminary, but I do recall the word *olam*. It is translated “world,” but it could also be “aeon” or “spiritual realm”. It means everything created in the whole expanse of time and space, all of God’s creation in its mystery and infinity. The Hebrews had already gotten to the continuum of time and space way back then. What if we read Wesley to be saying this: “the *olam* is my parish,” in other words, the continuous expanse of space and time in the hand of God. This makes good theological sense, since we believe that the communion of the Church comprises not only continents but centuries. If only we could see from the God’s eye point of view, we would recognize our Eucharist as a communion that includes the apostles, our grandparents, and our grandchildren, as well as nations and peoples we have never met. The perspective of *olam* is the perspective that the book of Revelation offers when it says on the last day all will be gathered before the throne of the wounded Lamb.

If we stretch far enough to say “*olam* is our parish,” then we are called to minister to our grandchildren as well as the people in our pews and our neighborhoods. We pray only for our daily bread, and we are told by the Lord to leave to tomorrow its worry. And just the same, we are told in Deuteronomy to teach our children as we sit and as we walk, with a reminder of the Word of God on our doorposts and our very heads. Our grandchildren, literally and figuratively, ought to be our prime concern, and what kind of world and what kind of church they will inhabit. Again, most of this happens in congregations, but we need to find ways in the coming years to encourage this work. A small down payment is our confirmation weekend again this winter, but we want to do more in the area of catechism and formation in both English and Spanish. It is a quiet one but an imperative goal as well.

“*Olam* is our parish.” In time and space in their expanse that is a hard thing to understand but nonetheless real as we worship the God who holds all of that in His hand. But the world is also fallen, and so they are interlaced with what the New Testament calls the “powers and principalities,” structures of illusion and control, the matrix which in our time includes the worst features of technology. “The world is our parish,” there are ersatz forms

of this claim as well in our world today. They are seen in the dystopian moments that seem like something out of *The Lord of the Rings*. My charge to the Convention this day has an unapologetically luddite ring, that to have the world as our parish also means a warning against false kinds of supposed globalism or universality. I am aware that if I depended on my own efforts at farming, I would starve. But just the same, I want to read you some lyrics from the great 1960's folk singer John Prine: "blow up your TV, throw away your papers, move to the country, build a home, plant a little garden, eat a lot of peaches, and try to find Jesus on our own." For us community is embodied and globalism in the Eucharist is as real as eating together. For us in the 21st century, it has its fake versions as well. And its corruption is already upon us, though we cannot yet see it, and part of our ministry in the coming years will be to see it and call it out more and more.

Knowing the future, for us, our Church, our nation, our world, however is not our task. It is enough to commit it into the hands of the God who already holds the whole *olam*. It is enough to do our humble and yet breathtaking part, which is designated as giving thanks to God, Father, Son, and the Holy Spirit, on behalf of our parish, and our neighborhood, and the diversity of our diocese, and the diversity of Anglicanism, and our sibling churches across continents and generations.

Before I close, let me go back to my late friend Ralph. Well, yes, we are all recalling and telling the same story over and over, many times, not once, the one story by divine mandate, the one told in this diocese and throughout the entire Communion Sunday by Sunday, in a plethora of dialects, as long as God wills that the *olam* should run, we are narrating the deeds of God in our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ on the world's behalf. Amen.

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The Chair called upon the Rev. D. J. Griffin to lead noonday prayers. Convention was then recessed for lunch until 1:30pm.

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After lunch the Chair reconvened the Convention.

Bp. Sumner called upon Aguer Atem Deng from St. Philip's Sudanese Mission to share a word from the Diocesan Youth.

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The Chair called on Mrs. Jolayne LaCour, Chair of the Credentials Committee, to come to the dais for the second credentials report.

2019 – C01 Proposed Amendment to Canon 14: To Expand Vestry Election Methods

CANON 14
WARDENS AND VESTRY OF PARISHES

Section 14.1 Except as otherwise provided in this Canon, all members of the Vestry shall be elected by ballot at an Annual Parish Meeting by **(a)** a majority of votes cast by the qualified voters present **or (b) by such lesser vote (such as a plurality) of the qualified voters present as may be approved by a majority vote of the qualified voters present;** and, except as herein otherwise provided, the term of office shall be for three (3) years succeeding their election.

Rationale:

Every parish in the diocese is required by Canon 13 to hold an Annual Parish Meeting, at which they elect new members to their Vestries. However, the details of those meetings and methods of obtaining candidates for Vestries vary widely. Some parishes present a large slate of candidates while others present only the number needed for election. Some use a nominating committee and others do not. Election by a majority requires every person elected to the Vestry to receive 51% of the votes cast. That means that many parishes will have long Annual Parish Meetings and go into multiple ballots for their Vestry elections. Allowing parishes some flexibility will streamline elections for parishes who desire it and encourage participation in Annual Parish Meetings. Parishes who desire to elect by majority will still be able to do so. This simply allows parishes to do what is good for them at a local level, while still requiring that Vestry members be elected by the people of the parish they serve at a duly called meeting of the Parish.

After the election of the clergy for Executive Council, the Chair announced the results of the first paper ballot for lay delegate to General Convention.

The Rev. Michael Mills, Good Shepherd, Dallas, rose to move adoption of a rule change stating that beginning with the second ballot on any election, the total number of nominees shall not exceed twice the number of open positions. The nominee(s) to drop off the ballot are those who received the fewest votes in a plurality of both houses in the previous vote. The motion was seconded, and a voice vote was taken. As it requires a 2/3 vote to change the rules of Convention, the results were inconclusive. A vote with raising of hands/voting cards was taken, and the rule change passed.

At the conclusion of voting, the Chair notified the sergeants-at-arms that they could re-open the doors and reminded delegates to turn in their voting devices upon the conclusion of Convention.

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REPORT FROM THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Chair called upon the Treasurer, Mrs. Mary Sonom, to make a report on the 2020 budget.

Mrs. Sonom recognized the members of the Finance Committee and thanked them for their service. She then noted that the Finance Committee was committed in 2019 to providing increased resources for financial education and workshops throughout the year.

Mrs. Sonom reported on 2018 end-of-year finances, financial position for the remainder of 2019, and the proposed budget for 2020 found on page 43 and following of the Convention booklet.

Mrs. Sonom also thanked the audit committed for their work on the 2018 Audit.

Bp. Sumner spoke in regards to giving to the wider Episcopal Church. In 2020, the alternative giving option will continue, and the diocese will increase the amount given to both the alternative giving and to General Convention. Specifically, the diocese will increase the total amount given to the wider Episcopal church to approximately 12%, with about 9% going to General Convention. The goal is to reach giving the diocese's full assessment to General Convention, which is now mandatory.

Mrs. Sonom then moved the adoption of the proposed budget as approved by the Finance Committee and Executive Council.

Elected Mrs. Lana Valenta as Secretary of the Standing Committee.

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

2019

The Executive Council of the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas administers the Missionary, Social Service and Christian Education work of the Diocese and is charged with the fiduciary responsibility of budget and finances of the Diocese. It also discharges such other duties as may be entrusted to it by the Convention.

2019 ACTIONS OF EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

January 8, 2019

No financial reports were presented as the year-end reports for 2018 are still in progress.

A correction to the 2019 housing allowance resolution for The Revd Ryan Pollock was presented. Mr. Fred Ellis moved that the resolution be accepted. Ms. Adele Ichilian seconded. Motion carried.

REPORTS TO THE 125th ANNUAL MEETING

Saturday, November 7, 2020

February 12, 2019

Ms. Mary Sonom, Diocesan Treasurer, presented the preliminary December 2018 financial reports, which reflected a surplus of approximately \$400,000. Ms. Sonom reviewed a proposal to consolidate & rename the eight existing Executive Council Restricted Funds into five funds.

- Mission Development Land Reserve renamed NW McKinney Property Reserve
- Provincial Synod Reserve renamed TEC Participation Reserve
- Salary Reserve & Building Maintenance Reserve combined into the Operating Reserve
- Title IV Compliance Reserve renamed the Legal Compliance Reserve
- Former Revolving Fund & New Mission Congregation Reserve combined into a Congregational Support & Development Reserve

Ms. Sonom also presented a proposal to rebate a portion of the 2018 surplus to the congregations. The rebate would be the difference between what a congregation actually paid in assessment in 2018 with what their assessment would have been had it been figured in the next lower percentage bracket. (Example: A parish that paid \$3,150 based on a 12% bracket, would have paid \$2,880 using an 11% bracket. Therefore, \$3,150 - \$2,880 would result in a rebate of \$262.00.) The total amount to be rebated is \$260,983, leaving a remainder of \$139,017, which would be divided into two new Executive Council Restricted Funds:

- Clergy Development & Support Reserve - \$112,603.77
- Theological Development Reserve - \$26,413.23

Both the Executive Council Restricted Funds consolidation and the rebate to the congregations had been approved at the February 12th Finance Committee meeting. The Revd Thomas Kincaid moved that both the consolidation of the Executive Council Restricted Funds and the rebate to the congregations be approved by Executive Council. Mr. Fred Ellis seconded. Motion carried.

The Council reviewed a request from St. Luke's (Dallas) to modify its existing lease agreement with Park Cities Day School to expand the premises being leased per the terms of a Lease Expansion Proposal dated January 20, 2019. Mr. Fred Ellis moved that the lease agreement be approved. No second was required as the agreement had previously been approved by the Finance Committee. Motion carried.

The Council also reviewed a request from Holy Trinity by the Lake (Heath) to enter into an extension of its existing lease agreement with Casa School until August 31, 2019, per the terms of an Amended Lease Agreement effective January 1, 2019. Mr. Fred Ellis moved that the lease agreement be approved. No second was required as the agreement had previously been approved by the Finance Committee. Motion carried.

March 2019

No meeting was held.

April 9, 2019

The financial reports for January 2019, February 2019, & March 2019 were presented. Ms. Adele Ichilian moved that the financial reports be approved. The Revd Chris Steele seconded. Motion carried.

Mr. Fred Ellis moved that, with the closing of St. David's (Garland), the parish's assessment of \$6,099 be adjusted to \$0 & footnoted in the 2019 Diocesan budget. Mr. David Pinson seconded. Motion carried.

May 14, 2019

The financial reports for April 2019 were presented. Mr. Fred Ellis moved that the financial reports be approved. No second was required as the reports had previously been approved by the Finance Committee. Motion carried.

During an executive session of the Council:

Bishop Sumner proposed that the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas bestow a grant of \$250,000 from the Congregational Support and Development fund to St. Barnabas (Garland). The Revd Thomas Kincaid moved that the grant be approved. Ms. Stevi McCoy seconded. Motion carried.

June 11, 2019

The financial reports for May 2019 were presented. Mr. Paul Lasiter moved that the financial reports be approved. No second was required as the reports had previously been approved by the Finance Committee. Motion carried.

- Line 62, Support for the Broader Episcopal Church, was corrected to \$463,878 (12% of Line 1).
- Line 20, Congregational Development Contingency, was increased to \$36,272.

Mr. Paul Lasiter moved that the 2020 preliminary budget be approved as revised. Ms. Adele Ichilian seconded. Discussion followed. Motion carried.

September 10, 2019

No business was transacted as a quorum was not achieved.

October 15, 2019

The financial reports for August 2019 & September 2019 were presented. Mr. Paul Lasiter moved that the financial reports be approved. No second was required as the reports had previously been approved by the Finance Committee. Motion carried.

A housing allowance resolution for The Revd Deng Pager was presented. The Revd Andy Johnson moved that the resolution be accepted. No second was required as the resolution had previously been approved by the Finance Committee. Motion carried.

November 2, 2019

The One Hundred Twenty-fourth Annual Meeting was held at Parish Episcopal School.

December 10, 2019

The financial reports for October 2019 & November 2019 were presented. The Revd Craig Reed moved that the financial reports be approved. No second was required as the reports had previously been approved by the Finance Committee. Motion carried. Mr. Fred Ellis moved that, if the current surplus remains, the Theological Training Grant for 2019 not be disbursed, or that the Grant be disbursed proportional to any remaining surplus as of 31 December. No second was required as the motion had previously been approved by the Finance Committee. Motion carried.

The 2020 housing allowance resolution for Diocesan-paid clergy was presented. Mr. Fred Ellis moved that the resolution be accepted. No second was required as the resolution had previously been approved by the Finance Committee. Motion carried.

A proposal for a land swap between St. Mark's (Irving) & the City of Irving was presented. Discussion followed. Ms. Jolayne LaCour moved that the Council commend the proposal to the Corporation Board. The Revd Craig Reed seconded. Motion carried.

A request to amend the 2018 Parochial Report for St. Matthew's Cathedral was presented. Line 5 on page three (Other operating income) included a pass-through amount for the Stanton Center of \$22,272. The removal of this amount would reduce Line A (Normal Operating Income) from \$705,462 to \$683,190. It would also reduce the Cathedral's 2020 Diocesan assessment by \$2,896 (from \$77,611 to \$74,715). Mr. Fred Ellis moved that the 2018 Parochial Report correction & 2020 Assessment reduction be approved. No second was required as the motion had previously been approved by the Finance Committee. Motion carried.

Bishop Sumner requested the Council discontinue the "Outreach Within the Episcopal Church" Option Designation for the 2021 fiscal year and that the percentage of the Diocesan budget set aside in 2021 be conveyed to the Budget of the General Convention in its entirety. Mr. Fred Ellis moved that the Bishop's request be approved. The Revd Catherine Thompson seconded. Discussion followed. Mr. Fred Ellis moved that the motion be tabled until the Council's February 11th meeting. Ms. Lee Spence seconded. Motion carried.

Bishop Sumner requested a revision to the 2019 Option Designations for the Support of the Broader Church. The options approved at Diocesan Convention for the 2019 Budget were the Dioceses of North Dakota & Cuba. The Bishop requested

The College Ministry Commission (CMC) was commissioned by Bishop James M. Stanton, January 2012, to encourage and enable parishes to minister to college communities throughout the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas both on and off college campuses. Also, this commission seeks to facilitate, encourage and support parish ministry to our college communities with the goal of helping students grow as disciples of Christ by engaging them in scripture and prayer and encouraging them in leadership.

In 2019 the following parishes in the diocese engaged with college aged young people for Bible study, fellowship, outreach, and other activities:

COLLEGE OF DEACONS
2019

The College of Deacons is an essential ministry in the diocese, called to model servant ministry for others, to interpret to the Church the needs, concerns, and hopes of the world. Deacons are called to engage members of the church in the mission of

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meeting the needs, sharing the concerns and kindling the hopes of others. Deacons live into this call in a wide variety of ways.

Some deacons serve on the bishop's staff, and on diocesan councils and commissions. For example, Deacon Mark Hall serves as the Diocesan Deacon for Outreach and Social Justice (appointed by Bishop Sumner in 2017). His charge is to facilitate EDOD parishes in reaching out to our brothers and sisters in Christ through the Greater Dallas Coalition, and to serve as a resource for outreach ministry generally in EDOD. Some deacons are active in Kairos ministry, some serve as hospital chaplains, and some serve as deans for summer camp at Camp All Saints. Deacons are participants and leaders in both domestic and world-wide mission efforts, and active in the Dallas community on boards and commissions. Deacons are retreat leaders and community gardeners; deacons are involved in healing ministries like Community of Hope and Stephen Ministry. In their parishes, deacons help organize outreach activities, are leaders in Christian education (Education for Ministry, Christian Formation, Bible Study), and offer pastoral care to the sick and the homebound. Deacons accompany the bishops on visitations to the parishes.

The annual deacons' meeting with the bishop was held at the Diocesan Office on January 12, 2019. Bishop Sumner led a discussion of scripture, and then celebrated Eucharist with us. 21 of the 23 currently active deacons were present. Following lunch, each deacon shared about their ministry, their joys and their challenges.

In February Archdeacon Rosemary Trei represented Bishop Sumner at the Movement DFW conference at Dallas Baptist University. Also in February, Rosemary represented our diocese at the AED Archdeacons Conference in Albuquerque. Many good ideas were shared about helping all members of our dioceses be aware of the role of deacons, and also encouraging folks to discern possible calls to the diaconate. During the summer of 2019, Deacons submitted stories about their ministry and their call to the diaconate to the Archdeacon. These stories were published in the monthly EDOD newsletter.

Our annual Deacons' Retreat was held September 12-14 at Camp All Saints and was led by Bishop Michael Smith. Bishop Michael led us in reflections on "Diaconia and the Better Part: Luke 10:38-42." In one session, we compiled notes on Advice to a New Deacon, which were later distributed to all deacons. 18 Deacons attended the retreat.

Deacons participated in the Annual Diocesan Clergy Conference at Camp Allen. Deacons also served in the Diocesan Eucharist in November. Deacons accompanied Bishop Sumner and Assisting Bishop Smith on 45 visitations to parishes throughout the year. As of December, we have 23 active deacons (3 not canonically resident) and 5 retired deacons (3 still semi-active) in the diocese.

COMMISSION ON MINISTRY

2019

The Commission on Ministry (COM) fulfills the canonical requirement to advise the Bishop in the implementation of Title III.6 and III.8 of the Canons of The Episcopal Church, in the determination of the present and future needs for ministry, and in the design and oversight of the process for recruitment, discernment, formation, and assessment of persons for ministry.

The Commission conducted 9 meetings over the course of the year to examine and interview those responding to a call for Holy Orders. Those sessions included:

- hosted 9 aspirants at the annual discernment retreat,
- interviewed 9 nominees for postulancy
- interviewed 3 postulants for candidacy

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- interviewed 3 candidates for Diaconate
- interviewed 7 deacons for the priesthood
- there were 3 candidates examined by the Board of Examining Chaplains, a sub-committee of the Commission.

The Commission is a dedicated group of 18 members plus 2 Ex-Officio members from across the diocese. I thank the members of COM for their commitment of time, their prayers and their dependence on our Lord for discernment for all ministry vocations both ordained and lay. It is with great pleasure I serve as chair to this group under the direction of our bishop.

A detailed timeline was developed to guide the Committee in its work. The Bishop set this one-day convention to be held at the Parish Episcopal School, 4101 Sigma Road, Dallas, TX. The Head of School, Dave Monaco graciously offered the use of the facility and staff for the Convention purposes. The date of the Convention was to be November 2, 2019. As in the previous year, the Committee had the responsibility for rental of equipment, audio/visual, catering, and creating an inviting convention space. Site visits to the school and meetings with various vendors were scheduled throughout the summer. Fr. Perry Mullins chaired the Nominating Committee from May to August.

The Reverend David Faulkner directed the worship. The Festival of Eucharist began at 8:30 am in the Chapel. Altar Guild duties were provided by members of the Saint Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church Altar Guild.

The convention space was decorated with banners from parishes in the Diocese. Adele Ichilian organized the 28 Vendors and Exhibitors that exhibited a wide variety of items and programs. These exhibits shared the space with the breakfast and lunch set up in the gym adjacent to the convention space. This allowed for maximum exposure during meals and breaks. Annette Jenkins, Executive Director of One Man's Treasure once again requested permission to exhibit at the Convention and requested gently worn coats for men coming out of prison. This service project has been a great success.

By November 1, 2019 all was in place and a well-coordinated, highly successful Convention was held.

CURATE DEVELOPMENT
2019

During the program year, our diocesan curates gather each month to discuss and think theologically about some aspect of ministry, led by one of our diocesan clergy or another guest leader and focused by assigned reading. We rotate our meeting locations to various congregations of our diocese to give curates a sense of ministry beyond their particular cure, and we also gather once for an overnight retreat at Camp All Saints. Our aim is for our curates to grow in practical skills for ministry and for the priestly life, to think theologically about all aspects of ministry practice, and to build a cohort of friends and colleagues. Curacy grants from EDOD help fund multiple curates each year, along with their ongoing development. On the whole, we in EDOD are able to place and train more curates for future ministry than most dioceses, which is a blessing for our diocese and for the wider church.

EPISCOPAL CENTER FOR RENEWAL
2019

I am grateful for the work that God is doing for the renewal of his church through the ministry of the Episcopal Center for Renewal. We have been blessed with a dedicated group of leaders that have walked through a major transition, and we are beginning to see the fruit of that labor.

In 2019 the Episcopal Center for Renewal offered two retreat weekends and several other events designed to promote personal renewal in Christ. The retreats were at Prothro Center in June and Camp Crucis in October. In each of our activities,

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we focus on developing a basic skillset for continued growth in Christ. The weekend is designed as an immersion learning experience, offering opportunities for personal conversion, community worship, small group discipleship, and personal testimonies. The Bible and the Book of Common Prayer are the primary resources used for prayer and study.

The Renewal Center took in a total of \$10,459 in fees and donations in 2019 and expended \$8,210. The net income for the year was \$2,249.

We focused on developing a governance model for the Renewal Center in 2019. In consultation with the two dioceses we serve, the governance model selected is an independent non-profit corporation with our bishops under the direction of our bishops. We are grateful for their continued leadership and support as we seek to renew the church and expand God's kingdom.

We hope that the Renewal Weekend will be a useful tool for the renewal of our diocese as we seek to engage in the work of Christ's Kingdom here in north Texas.

EPISCOPAL FOUNDATION OF DALLAS

Organization

The Episcopal Foundation of Dallas ("the Foundation") was established by the Diocesan Convention of 1950. It is organized as a Texas non-profit corporation and is qualified as a Section 501(c)(3) exempt organization. The Foundation exists to strengthen and support faith communities by partnering wise investments with purposeful giving. It offers investment management services within the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas and supports organizations within the Diocese through its annual grant program. The Foundation is professionally managed and is governed by a Board of Trustees, all of whom are committed to good stewardship, prudent investment and faithful disbursement of the funds entrusted to the Foundation. The Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas serves as an ex officio member of the board.

Investment Services

The Foundation's investment management services are available to any parish, mission, school or other non-profit Episcopal organization in the Diocese.

All investment assets are pooled and invested according to a diversified asset allocation described in our investment policy. This structure creates an opportunity for clients to invest at reduced fees not otherwise available to smaller investors. The portfolio includes actively- and passively-managed mutual funds, diversified both as to fixed income and equity holdings with an aim of long-term growth. Members of the Investment and Finance committee have decades of experience in multiple investment institutions and are responsible for the supervision of the portfolio of the Foundation.

Donor Advised Funds

The Foundation is now offering individuals a way to direct and manage their charitable contributions through donor-advised funds. Creating a fund with EFD allows individuals an economical way to focus on their charitable giving without the burden of paperwork or grant administration. The Foundation staff is available to assist in identifying grant opportunities within the Diocese if needed.

The Foundation's Episcopal Fund generates income for annual grants that benefit the entire Diocesan community. A direct contribution, memorial gift or bequest to the Episcopal Fund is a meaningful way to honor a loved one's life or your own commitment to the Episcopal Church. Annual Grant Program

The Foundation's annual grant program exists to support the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas, its churches, schools and agencies – that means you! Our particular emphasis is toward funding programs or ministries that address the problems of

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poverty, homelessness, and food insecurity but Diocesan entities may apply for other needs as well. Since inception, the Foundation has awarded over \$6 million to the Diocesan community.

In February 2020, the Foundation pledged \$200,000 to the Diocese to support parishes in need of operating support as result of the COVID-19 crisis. These grants were made available through an application to the Diocese. In June 2020, the Foundation awarded an additional \$142,500 through its own annual grant program. There were 23 grants benefitting parishes, schools and non-profits throughout the Diocese.

The Foundation's sister foundation, the Episcopal Health Foundation of Dallas, which is managed by the same Board has its own annual grant program. The primary purpose of the Episcopal Health Foundation is to provide funding for medical care, medical research, and medical education. The Episcopal Health Foundation has awarded over \$8 million in grants since its inception. Applications and information are available on our website.

EVANGELISM INITIATIVE

2019

During 2019, Canon Evangelist Carrie Headington and the Evangelism Commission led several projects and initiatives working with various parishes in the Diocese as well as with other denominations and groups throughout the Dallas area.

The **Evangelist-in-Residence** program continued, and Canon Headington spent extended time at St. Stephen's, Sherman, and Good Shepherd, Terrell, teaching on evangelism and helping those parishes establish systems and plans for outreach in their communities.

In addition to the extended time at those two parishes, Canon Headington led **evangelism trainings** and teachings at several other parishes: St. Peter's, McKinney; St. David's, Denton; St. Paul's, Greenville; St. Luke's, Dallas; St. Matthew's, Dallas; Gateway of Grace, Dallas; and Holy Cross, Dallas. She also spoke at the Rural Church Gathering, EDOD College Retreat, and annual Clergy Conference at Camp Allen.

On May 4, the diocese sponsored a **missions day entitled "Mission Launch: Bringing God's Change Agents Together"** at St. Luke's, Dallas. Over 100 people from 40 parishes attended, and guest speakers included Rebecca Manley Pippert and leaders in digital evangelism from the national church. Also at this event was the first commissioning of the **Order of Lay Evangelists**. Over 30 Lay Evangelists were commissioned that day, and a retreat was held in September where 5 more were commissioned. At the **Lay Evangelist Retreat**, Mary Schaller spoke about her book, *The Nine Arts of Spiritual Conversations*.

The Episcopal Diocese of Dallas continued its **partnership with churches in South Dallas through the Greater Dallas Coalition**. Through this partnership, a summer camp for youth was held in July – Dallas Champions Camp – which also included one-day camp at the jail in Gainesville, TX. In addition, two tours of South Dallas ministries were held which visited sites including True Lee Baptist Church, Inspired Vision Compassion Center, Our Saviour Episcopal Church, and Bonton Farms.

One of the biggest events of the year was the **Racial Reconciliation training day for clergy** held in September and the establishment of the **Racial Healing, Justice, and Reconciliation Commission**. This event brought together the clergy of the diocese to begin the important discussion of racial reconciliation. The Rev. Matthew Burdette was the main speaker at the event.

THE GATHERING

2019

Throughout 2019, “The Gathering” continued to fulfill its stated mission, to build and nurture a loving and compassionate faith community where the housed and unhoused gather to seek healing, spiritual fulfillment and Christian community, attending to the pastoral and physical needs of displaced members of the Body of Christ. In 2019, our seventh year, we provided 52 Sunday services, involved 32 clergy and over 550 lay volunteers in our mission, served 5500 meals, provided 100 sleeping bags, 35 tents, 125 backpacks, 500 hygiene packs, 1500 pairs of socks, and 150 blankets, as well as coats, hats, scarves and gloves, to carry our homeless members through the winter. Our leadership team provided countless hours of volunteer services, zeroing-in on the physical, spiritual and pastoral needs of our members. Though financial support has been difficult, we are blessed by the giving hearts of both parishes and individuals, and we plan a fundraising effort for late 2020. Our continuing goal is to involve more and more parishes, priests, deacons and laity in our work to bolster our perceived call: to fulfill Christ’s mandate to all Christians, found in the 25th chapter of St. Matthew’s gospel.

HOLY FAMILY SCHOOL

2019

Founded in 1951 as a mission of the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas, Holy Family School in McKinney, Texas continues to serve the children of our community in 2019. The original vision of Father Jose and Dr. Maria Luisa Vega was to make sure that the young children of migrant farm workers were academically, physically and socially ready for public school. Now located at 500 Throckmorton in the former E.S. Doty High School, Holy Family continues to honor and promote that vision today within our diverse community.

At full capacity Holy Family serves approximately 75 children from ages six weeks through PreK. However, the pandemic has greatly reduced our numbers. We are committed to safely keeping our doors open, even during the shelter in place we remained open throughout in order to care for the children of essential workers.

Our community partners include McKinney Roots, Collin County Meals on Wheels, McKinney Housing Authority, Community Lifeline, McKinney Hunger Free Coalition, North Texas Food Bank and our 500 Throckmorton neighbors at the Community Garden Kitchen. Together we work to make sure the children in our care have access to the very best education opportunities, regardless of their parents’ ability to pay. We embrace our rich cultural background and we celebrate our neighborhood’s diversity.

With the continued support of the EDOD and our community partners, we hope to weather the Covid-19 storm and look forward to at least another 68 years of service to the children of McKinney.

Nick Funk accepted a call as rector at St. Paul's in Greenville and Fr. Gary Hill assumed the responsibility as Priest-in-Charge at St. Wm. Laud after the retirement of The Rev. Terry Matthew.

The Rural Church Commission chaired by Rebecca Welborn organized and planned another successful Gathering of rural churches. The annual meeting was again hosted by St. Dunstan's and once again we saw by the large turn out that there continues to be an interest within our rural congregations to have this opportunity to come together. Bishop Sumner and Bishop Lawton both offered inspiring presentations and challenged the various congregations to be all they can be in the coming year.

Bishop Lawton has been given the responsibility of oversight for the congregations in Winnsboro, Mt. Pleasant, Pittsburg, and Sulphur Springs. He will be working and coordinating their various ministries in East Texas and St. Dunstan's becomes the Pro-cathedral for that area of the diocese.

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Our third annual Rural Clergy Conference was hosted once again by Fr. David Faulkner at Good Shepherd in Terrell and again this year we enjoyed a good attendance with the majority of our rural clergy in attendance.

While I spent a goodly portion of the year serving as interim at St. Dunstan's, I was still able to make a personal visit with most of the rural congregations during the latter part of the year and had opportunities to both preach and celebrate.

The Stanton Center at Saint Matthew's Cathedral serves the Diocese of Dallas by providing: • a variety of courses in theology and spirituality, which meet the needs of Christians who desire to grow and mature in their discipleship. • diploma programs for lay leaders in our parishes - with special emphasis in the formation of students for the Order of Lay Evangelists and Order of Lay Catechists. • the required education and preparation for individuals seeking ordination to the Diaconate in the Diocese of Dallas. The Stanton Center seeks to restore the historic role of the Cathedral as the center for mission and spiritual life in the Diocese of Dallas. The focus of the Center's mission is to equip and sustain lay and ordained leaders, enabling them to carry out the Great Commission and the Great Commandment. In this way the Center assists the Diocese in nurturing and maintaining the sacred traditions of the Church and enabling all Christians to answer the call to ministry which is received in Baptism. Recent efforts to expand our student base include reaching out to persons for whom the long drive to classes at the Cathedral would be difficult by offering online classes and by providing a Stanton Center course (The Book of Common Prayer and Everything Anglican) at a satellite location (Frisco) for students in the northern part of the Diocese.

Forty-one students registered for classes in the 2019-2020 academic year. Two students were awarded Diplomas in Christian Ministry and one was awarded a Licentiate in Diaconal Ministry.

The University was founded by church leaders from the southeastern United States in 1857 and is the only university in the nation that is owned and governed by dioceses of The Episcopal Church, specifically the 28 dioceses that are successors to the original founding dioceses. The historic ownership and governance of the University by these Episcopal dioceses has produced a living synergy of leadership, resource, and mutual support, enriching the Church and advancing the University's role in American higher education.

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying consolidated financial statements of Episcopal Diocese of Dallas of the Protestant Episcopal Church and controlled organizations (the Diocese), which comprise the consolidated statements of financial position as of December 31, 2019 and 2018, and the related consolidated statements of activities and changes in net assets, statements of functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the consolidated financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Consolidated Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these consolidated financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of consolidated financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these consolidated financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audits to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the consolidated financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the consolidated financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the consolidated financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the consolidated financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the consolidated financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Diocese as of December 31, 2019 and 2018, and the results of their operations and their cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matter***Report on Supplementary Information***

Our audits were conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the consolidated financial statements as a whole. The accompanying Consolidating Schedule of Financial Position by Fund Type and Entity and the Consolidating Schedule of Activities by Fund Type and Entity are presented for purposes of additional analysis rather than to present the financial position, results of operations and cash flows of the individual entities, and is not a required part of the consolidated financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the consolidated financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audits of the consolidated financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the consolidated financial statements or to the consolidated financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the consolidated financial statements as a whole.

Note 1 – Description of Diocese

The Episcopal Diocese of Dallas of the Protestant Episcopal Church (the Diocese) is an unincorporated association, which complies with the Constitution and Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America (ECUSA) and recognizes the authority of the General Convention of the Church. The Diocese includes a twenty-five county area in Northeast Texas. The Bishop of the Diocese of Dallas (the Bishop) has jurisdiction over all affiliated organizations within the Diocese including parishes, missions, schools and other charitable organizations and funds.

The Endowment of the Episcopate (the EOE) is a trust that was set up and segregated to own and manage investments that provide income for the compensation of the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, and the Bishop Suffragan. The Constitution of the Diocese requires an endowment fund to be managed and controlled by a Board of Trustees appointed by the Bishop. After paying the necessary expenses incident to the management of the EOE, such portion of the EOE and the earnings thereof, as determined by the Board of Trustees (not to take more from the principal than seven percent of its value at the beginning of the year), are applied annually toward the compensation of the Bishop of the Diocese, and of the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, and of the Suffragan Bishops, if there be any, or for other expenses of the Office of the Bishop or general Diocesan purposes.

The Diocese assumed management of the All Saints Camp and Conference Center (the Camp) in 2010. Consequently, under accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP), the financial position, activities and changes in net assets, and cash flows of the Camp are consolidated with those of the Diocese. The Camp is considered an evangelism and outreach program.

As the Diocese, the EOE, and the Camp, collectively referred to hereafter as the Diocese, are under common control, these financial statements have been consolidated to reflect the results of all three organizations.

The Corporation of the Episcopal Diocese (the Corporation) is a separate not-for-profit entity and was formed to hold title to all the real estate occupied by the various parishes and missions within the twenty-five county Diocese. In most cases, the Corporation holds nominal title to the property with the individual parish being the beneficial titleholder.

Principles of Consolidation

These financial statements include the accounts of the Diocese (Operating Funds and Special Funds), consolidated with the EOE, and the Camp. These consolidated financial statements are the responsibility of the Diocese's management. These accounting policies conform to U.S. GAAP and have been consistently applied in the preparation of the consolidated financial statements.

All significant inter-entity transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

New Accounting Pronouncement – Implemented

In June 2018, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2018-08, *Clarifying the Scope and Accounting Guidance for Contributions Received and Contributions Made* (ASU 2018-08). ASU 2018-08 provides clarification in evaluating whether transactions should be accounted for as contributions (nonreciprocal transactions) within the scope of Topic 958, Not-for-Profit Entities, or as exchange (reciprocal) transactions subject to other guidance and determining whether a contribution is conditional. The Diocese adopted ASU 2018-08 as a resource recipient as of the date of the initial application of January 1, 2019. Management is still in the process of determining the impact of this pronouncement as a resource provider. The Diocese applied ASU 2018-08 using the modified retrospective method. However, the adoption of the new standard did not have a significant effect on earnings or on the timing of the Diocese's contributions.

In March 2017, the FASB issued ASU No. 2017-07, *Improving the Presentation of Net Periodic Pension Cost and Net Periodic Postretirement Benefit Cost* (ASU 2017-07). ASU 2017-07 requires that employers report the service cost component in the same line item as other compensation costs arising from services rendered by employees during the period. ASU 2017-07 was implemented effective January 1, 2019 with retrospective application to 2018 disclosures resulting in service cost of \$66,823 and \$81,991 for 2019 and 2018, respectively, reported in operating activities and the remaining components of net periodic benefit costs reported in non-operating activities.

Description of Net Assets

Net assets are classified based on existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions as follows:

Without Donor Restrictions – consists of resources of the Diocese that have not been restricted by a donor. The major sources of revenue are parish assessments, Camp programs and activities, and investment income. The Board designated net assets for the Operating Funds of \$783,878 are more than the total net assets for the Operating Funds of \$422,403 due to the unfunded position on postretirement benefits of \$665,960.

With Donor Restrictions – defined as the portion of net assets that have a restriction on the specific use or the occurrence of a certain future event. Net assets consisting of the initial fair value of the gifts where the donor has specified the assets donated are to be retained in an endowment, providing a permanent source of revenue for charitable purposes, are classified as with donor restrictions. The accumulation of assets (above historic gift value) in donor restricted endowment funds is classified as with donor restrictions until appropriated for use based on the Diocese's spending policy. When the purpose restriction is accomplished, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported as net assets released from restrictions.

Estimates

Management uses estimates and assumptions in preparing financial statements. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, and reported revenues and expenses. Significant estimates used in preparing these consolidated financial statements include those assumed in recording depreciation, postretirement benefits, and the value of investments and notes receivable. It is at least reasonably possible that the significant estimates used will change within the next year.

Functional Expense Allocations

Expenses are allocated among program services and management and generally based on management's estimate of time spent on these functions by specific employees. The remaining costs are charged directly to the appropriate functional category.

Major Programs

Congregation support & development – Operating grants to existing congregations needing financial assistance to sustain their ministries. Financial support for ongoing efforts to plant new churches. Funding for work of the Diocesan leadership and personnel to further the vision of the Diocese.

Clergy support & development – Support for development of seminarians, curates and existing clergy including both financial and personnel resources and including theological research and development.

Evangelism & outreach – Funding for spreading the gospel throughout the Diocese and beyond its geographical boundaries.

Support of the wider Episcopal Church – Financial support for The Episcopal Church's General Convention as well as other ministries outside the Diocese of Dallas.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Diocese classifies all unrestricted demand deposits, money market funds and highly liquid debt investments with an initial maturity of three months or less as cash and cash equivalents. Cash and cash equivalents designated for investment are classified as investments.

Revenue, Receivables and Deferred Income from Programs

Receivables from programs represent amounts due from attendees of Camp programs and activities. Deferred income from programs represents advance payments to the Camp for programs and activities to be conducted in 2020. Revenue from Camp programs is recognized at the time participants attend the program or activity at the Camp.

Investments

Investments are recorded at their estimated fair value at the date of the consolidated financial statements. Investment transactions are recorded on their trade date. Unrealized and realized gains and losses are included in the consolidated statements of activities and changes in net assets. Interest income is recognized on the accrual basis and dividends are recognized on the ex-dividend date.

Investments, continued

Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; that is, an exit price. The exit price assumes the asset or liability is exchanged in an orderly transaction, and it is not a forced liquidation or distressed sale.

Assets and liabilities measured at fair value are classified in a hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques giving the highest priority to readily available unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements) when market prices are not readily available or reliable. The valuation levels are not necessarily an indication of the risk or liquidity associated with the underlying investment. The three levels of the hierarchy are described below:

- Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Diocese has the ability to access. Valuation adjustments and block discounts are not applied to Level 1 instruments. Since valuations are based on quoted prices that are readily and regularly available in an active market, valuation of these products does not entail a significant degree of judgment.
- Level 2 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are based on directly or indirectly observable inputs such as quoted prices for similar assets in active markets and quoted prices in markets that are not active.
- Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable, significant to the fair value measurement, and reflect significant management judgment.

The Diocese's consolidated statements of financial position includes the following financial instruments that are required to be measured at fair value on a recurring basis:

- Investments in mutual funds and common stock are considered Level 1 assets and are reported at fair value based on quoted prices in active markets for identical assets at the measurement date.
- Investments held at the Episcopal Foundation of Dallas (the Foundation) are reported at fair value based on the fair value of the underlying assets in the funds as reported by the Foundation. The investments utilize the net asset value of the fund as a practical expedient to estimate the fair value.

Inventories

Camp inventories are stated at the lower of cost or market. Cost is determined by the first-in, first-out (FIFO) method.

Notes Receivable

The Diocese provides low-interest rate loans to organizations within the Diocese. These loans are stated at the principal balance and are due under various terms. Interest income is recognized when earned; however, accrual of interest is discontinued when an allowance for collectability is reserved against a loan. The Diocese examines all loans on an individual basis to determine the likelihood of collection and the need to provide an allowance for any uncollectible amounts. The Diocese has discretion regarding any borrower unable to meet its payments during the year, and may elect to write-off loans to assist these borrowers or extend the loan.

Land, Property, and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at cost when purchased or at fair value as of the date of the gift when donated. Major expenditures in excess of \$2,500 and those which substantially increase the useful lives of the assets are capitalized. Maintenance, repairs and replacements, which do not improve or extend the lives of the respective assets, are charged to operations when incurred. When property and equipment is sold or otherwise disposed of, the asset and related accumulated depreciation is removed, and any gain or loss is included in operations. Donated assets are reported as unrestricted support unless the donor has restricted the asset for a specific purpose. Assets donated with explicit restrictions regarding their use and contributions of cash that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as with donor restrictions support.

Absent donor stipulations regarding how long those donated assets must be maintained, the Diocese reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service as instructed by the donor. The Diocese reclassifies with donor restrictions net assets to without donor restrictions net assets at that time.

Depreciation is calculated using the straight-line method at rates sufficient to amortize the related costs over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets. Estimated useful lives range from 3 to 40 years.

Long-Lived Assets

The Diocese assesses potential impairments to its long-lived assets (primarily property and equipment) when there is evidence that events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of an asset may not be recovered. An impairment loss is recognized when the undiscounted cash flows expected to be generated by an asset (or group of assets) is less than its carrying amount. Any required impairment loss is measured as the amount by which the asset's carrying value exceeds its fair value and is recorded as a reduction in the carrying value of the related asset and a charge to operating results. There were no long-lived assets that were impaired at December 31, 2019 and 2018.

Postretirement Benefits

The Diocese estimates its postretirement benefit costs and obligations associated with its Medicare Supplement Plan using various actuarial assumptions and methodologies. Assumptions include the current discount rate, expected costs of the plan over time, and mortality rates. To assist in developing these assumptions and estimates, the Diocese uses the services of an independent actuary. Although the Diocese believes that the assumptions used are appropriate, differences between assumed and actual experience may affect the Diocese's operating results.

Revenues and Support

The Executive Council of the Diocese has the authority to assess the parishes and missions for support of the budget as established by the annual Diocesan Convention. The Diocese receives a substantial portion of its revenues from assessments on parishes and missions within the Diocese. Assessments receivable at the balance sheet date represent amounts due from various parishes and missions. No amounts are considered uncollectible as the Diocese fully expects to collect these amounts. Any excess assessments at year end are retained by the Diocese for use in the succeeding year.

Contributions are comprised of revenue from gifts, grants, and bequests. Contributions are considered to be without donor restriction unless they are specifically restricted by the donor. Contributions designated for future periods or restricted by the donor for specific purposes or in perpetuity are reported as contributions with donor restrictions.

Camp revenue represent amounts due from attendees of Camp programs and activities. Camp revenue is considered to be without donor restriction.

Income Taxes

The Diocese, the EOE, and the Camp are not-for-profit organizations that are exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

U.S. GAAP requires management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Diocese and recognize a tax liability if the Diocese has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the U.S. federal, state, or local tax authorities.

The Diocese has analyzed their tax positions and has concluded that as of December 31, 2019 and 2018, there are no uncertain positions taken, or expected to be taken, that would require recognition of a liability or disclosure in the consolidated financial statements.

Recent Accounting Pronouncements

In February 2016, the FASB issued ASU No. 2016-02, *Leases* (ASU 2016-02), which amends leasing guidance by requiring entities to recognize a right-of-use asset and a lease liability for all operating and capital leases with lease terms of greater than 12 months. The lease liability will be equal to the present value of the lease payments and the lease asset will be based on the lease liability, subject to adjustment, such as for initial direct costs. For the purposes of reporting on the consolidated statements of activities and changes in net assets, leases will continue to be classified as operating or capital, with lease expense in both cases calculated substantially the same as under the prior lease guidance. For leases with a term of 12 months or less, a lessee is permitted to make an accounting policy election not to recognize lease assets or liabilities and must recognize lease expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term. ASU 2020-05 extended the effective date of this standard for non-public entities. The updated guidance is effective for annual periods beginning after December 15, 2021. The Diocese is currently evaluating the impact of this guidance on its consolidated financial statements but expects most of its operating lease commitments will be subject to the new standard and thus be recognized as an operating lease liability and right-of-use asset upon adoption of ASU 2016-02.

In August 2018, the FASB issued ASU 2018-13, *Fair Value Measurement* (ASU 2018-13): *Disclosure Framework – Changes to the Disclosure Requirements for Fair Value Measurement*. This ASU modifies the disclosure requirements on fair value measurements in Topic 820. The amendments in ASU 2018-13 are effective for all entities for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2019. Changes in unrealized gains and losses, the range and weighted average of significant unobservable inputs used to develop Level 3 fair value measurements and the narrative description of measurement uncertainty should be applied prospectively for only the most recent interim or annual period presented in the initial fiscal year of adoption. All other amendments should be applied retrospectively to all periods presented upon their effective date. Management is in the process of determining the impact of this pronouncement.

In August 2018, the FASB issued ASU No. 2018-14, *Changes to the Disclosure Requirements for Defined Benefit Plans* (ASU 2018-14). ASU 2018-14 modifies the disclosure requirements for employers that sponsor defined benefit pension or other post retirement plans. ASU 2018-14 is effective for fiscal years ending after December 15, 2021. Management is in the process of determining the impact of this pronouncement.

Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the December 31, 2018 financial statements to conform to the December 31, 2019 presentation. There was no effect on the change in net assets or total net assets for all years presented.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events are events or transactions that occur after the statement of financial position date but before the consolidated financial statements are available to be issued. The Diocese recognizes in the consolidated financial statements the effects of all subsequent events that provide additional evidence about conditions that existed at the date of the consolidated statement of financial position, including the estimates inherent in the process of preparing the consolidated financial statements. The Diocese's consolidated financial statements do not recognize subsequent events that provide evidence about conditions that did not exist at the date of the consolidated statement of financial position but arose after the consolidated statement of financial position date and before the consolidated financial statements are available to be issued (see Note 14).

Funds invested with the Foundation are part of the Foundation's diversified portfolio of cash, fixed income securities, marketable equity securities, and alternative investments. This investment is valued based upon the Diocese's pro rata interest in the Foundation's agency investment funds (approximately 19% and 19% at December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively). This investment seeks to preserve assets through an investment return sufficient to offset inflation and enhance, where possible, assets through an investment return sufficient to achieve payout objectives and preserve the value of the corpus. The Diocese's investment may be redeemed at any time with no prior notice. The Foundation will normally remit funds by month end following a request for redemption. In the event of a total liquidation of the Diocese's investment, the Foundation may hold back a portion of the investment related to alternate investments which may be redeemed quarterly with a 90-day notice.

Note 7 – Note Payable, Related Party

On November 30, 2009, the Corporation made a \$1.3 million property loan to the Camp. The principal on this note is due and payable in annual installment payments in the amount of \$100,000 commencing November 30, 2012 through November 30, 2024. Accrued and unpaid interest of 3% is payable on the last day of each calendar month beginning October 31, 2012. Interest payments to the Corporation, are being waived.

Note 8 – Employee Retirement Benefits

The Diocese of Dallas contributes to a retirement plan for clergy employed by the Diocesan office which is maintained and administered by the Church Pension Group of the Episcopal Church (CPG). The Diocese makes annual contributions to the fund equal to 18% of compensation. Total contributions for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018 were approximately \$82,000 and \$120,000, respectively.

The Diocese contributes to another retirement plan for lay employees. This plan is maintained and administered by the CPG. The Diocese makes annual contributions to the fund equal to 10% of employee compensation. Total contributions for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018 were approximately \$49,000 and \$50,000, respectively.

The Diocese contributes to another retirement plan for employees of the Camp. This plan is maintained and administered by the CPG. The Camp makes annual contributions to the fund up to 10% of Camp employee compensation. The Diocese contributes 9% of the Camp's Executive Director's compensation and housing to another retirement plan administered by CPG. Total contributions for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018 were approximately \$30,000 and \$29,000, respectively.

The Diocese also has a postretirement noncontributory Medicare Supplement Plan that covers laity employees who meet certain eligibility requirements. The Diocese paid approximately \$44,400 and \$37,000 for retiree Medicare Supplement premiums for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively.

Note 10 – Endowment Funds

The Diocese's endowment funds consist of approximately six funds, including the EOE, established for a variety of purposes. The endowment funds include both donor-restricted endowment funds and funds designated by the Executive Council to function as endowment. As required by U.S. GAAP, net assets associated with endowment funds, including funds designated by the Executive Council to function as endowments, are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

The Diocese has interpreted Texas State Law as requiring it to periodically evaluate the amounts to be preserved as permanently restricted funds for those donor restricted endowment funds subject to Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA). In making such evaluation, the Diocese considers such factors as: (a) the duration and permanence of the fund, giving priority to the donor's intent that the fund be maintained permanently, (b) the purposes of the Diocese and the fund, (c) general economic conditions, (d) the possible effects of inflation and deflation, (e) the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments, (f) other resources of the Diocese, and (g) the investment policy of the Diocese.

Investment Objectives and Spending Policy

The Diocese's investment objective is to earn inflation-offsetting returns that preserve the real value of the assets and where possible earn enhanced returns to achieve the spending objectives of the programs supported by the endowments. Endowment assets include donor-restricted funds that the Diocese must hold in perpetuity as well as board-designated funds. The endowment assets are invested in a diversified investment portfolio designed to achieve a balance of income and growth objectives within prudent risk constraints.

After maintaining the real value of the permanent endowment funds, any remainder of total return is available for appropriation. State law allows the Diocese to appropriate so much of net appreciation as is prudent considering the Diocese's long-term and short-term needs, present and anticipated financial requirements, and expected total return on its investments, price level trends, and general economic conditions.

From time to time, the fair value of assets associated with individual donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the level the donor or UPMIFA requires the Diocese to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. As of December 31, 2019 and 2018, there were no deficiencies.

Note 11 – Concentrations of Risk

Two parishes comprise approximately 39% and 38% of total assessments received by the Diocese for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively. The Diocese had cash deposits with financial institutions that exceeded the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation insured limit at various times during the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018.

Note 12 – Related Party Activity

The Diocese offices in a building owned by the Corporation. The Corporation does not charge the Diocese for the use of these facilities.

Note 13 – Contingencies

The Diocese is party to various claims and complaints arising in the normal course of operations. In the opinion of management, all such matters are without merit, and an unfavorable disposition would not have a material effect on the financial position of the Diocese. Furthermore, the Diocese anticipates no losses due to environmental issues or hazardous employee working conditions.

Note 14 – Subsequent Events

In preparing the accompanying consolidated financial statements, the Diocese has reviewed events that have occurred after December 31, 2019, through September 10, 2020, the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued.

In March 2020, the World Health Organization declared the outbreak of a novel coronavirus (COVID-19) as a pandemic, which continues to spread globally. Due to the known and unknown effects on the global economy of such shutdowns, the US Government created programs to assist companies retain and pay employees during the shutdown period. One such program is called the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) under Division A, Title I of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act) loan through the Small Business Administration (SBA). The program allows businesses with fewer than 500 employees to receive a loan equal to 2.5 times their average monthly payroll, with limitations. The loan would be forgiven by the US Government if the entity keeps the employees on its payroll for 8 weeks following origination of the loan. In April 2020, the Diocese (Operating Funds) and Camp applied and received PPP loans of \$249,900 and \$100,400, respectively, granted by the SBA under the CARES Act. The loans have 1% interest and deferral of six months of principal and interest. The Diocese (Operating Funds) and Camp have the option to apply for loan forgiveness with the SBA or pay back the loan within two years. The Diocese and Camp plan to apply for forgiveness of the PPP loans sometime during the 4th quarter of 2020. The outbreak has also disrupted the Camp since most of its revenue streams are derived from public gatherings which have been postponed due to the outbreak. The Camp has historically operated at a loss. The Camp has been able to maintain adequate liquidity through a loan from the Corporation (see Note 7). In addition, the Diocese (Operating Funds) has committed to fund cash deficits through at least September 2021 to cover fixed costs. The duration and economic impact of the outbreak is uncertain but could have a material impact to the Diocese liquidity; see also Note 3.
