



PROCEEDINGS OF THE 125TH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF DALLAS

The Rt. Rev. George R. Sumner, Bishop of Dallas, served as Chair of the Convention and called the Convention to order.

Bishop Sumner welcomed all lay and clergy delegates and guests to the convention.

The Chair then called on David Parsons, Chancellor, to report on the number of ballots received and status of the quorum.

Mr. Parsons gave the following credentials report:

Clerical Order Lay Order

186 Canonically Resident 59 Parishes and Missions in the Diocese

63 Required for a Quorum 20 Required for a Quorum

123 Registered to Vote 170 Lay Delegates representing 52 Parishes and Missions registered

Mr. Parsons declared a quorum present in both orders and concluded his report.

The Bishop again recognized Mr. David Parsons, who presented the special *Rules of Procedure for the Annual Convention* written for the online convention. These rules were adopted by the paper ballot sent to all delegates prior to Convention. The Convention will revert to the prior rules for the convention in 2021. Mr. Parsons concluded his report.

RULES OF PROCEDURE FOR THE ANNUAL CONVENTION

Online Convention

1. Given the prevalence of COVID-19 in Texas, the potential dangers to health of an in-person convention, the fact that the previously published convention location is not able to accommodate us, and the inability of the Bishop to find a safe alternative venue for an in-person Convention, the Bishop, with the consent of the Standing Committee and with the advice of the Chancellor, has decided to hold the 2020 Annual Convention online via Zoom. These Special Rules of Procedure have been written to account for the exigencies of an online convention and will be presented for adoption by Convention when it meets. Upon adoption these rules will apply retroactively to all matters related to the online convention.

Presiding Officer

- 2. The Bishop or such other person as provided in the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese shall serve as presiding officer. The presiding officer may call to the chair any qualified person to relieve him temporarily. The presiding officer shall have full power and authority to take such action (consistent with the Constitution and Canons) as he deems necessary to expedite the orderly disposition of the business of the Convention.
- 3. After the Convention is called to order by the presiding officer, an opening prayer shall be offered by the presiding officer or someone designated by him.
- 4. The presiding officer shall have the authority to appoint a parliamentarian of his own choice to advise him on parliamentary questions arising during the Convention.
- 5. Any person addressing the chair or desiring recognition of the chair while the Convention is in session shall indicate their need to speak by selecting the appropriate option in Zoom and shall address the chair as "Right Reverend Sir" if the Bishop is in the chair. If some other person is in the chair, he shall be addressed as "Mister/Madam President."

Committees

6. In addition to the Nominating Committee provided for elsewhere in these Rules, the Ecclesiastical Authority, within a reasonable length of time before the convening of the Annual Convention, may appoint from among the officers and staff of the Diocese, the delegates of the Convention and such other confirmed persons in good standing as the Ecclesiastical Authority may designate, the following committees: Arrangements, Credentials,

Dispatch of Business, Constitution and Canons, Elections. Each committee shall consist of a chair and such other members as the Ecclesiastical Authority may determine. Each committee shall perform such duties as may be deemed necessary or advisable to facilitate the business of the Convention and any specific duties assigned to such committee by the presiding officer or under the Constitution and Canons or these Rules. Members of these committees shall continue in office until their respective successors are appointed.

Order of Business

- 7. The order of business to be presented to the Convention for adoption shall be established by the presiding officer in accordance with the Constitution and Canons.
- 8. Any item of business of the Convention may be set as a special order of business or taken up out of its regular order at any time by a two-thirds vote of the delegates. Subject to the foregoing, the presiding officer shall have the authority, within his discretion, to deviate from the order of business adopted, as the exigencies of the occasion may require.
- 9. After being organized and ready to proceed to business, the first order of business shall be the election of a Secretary and one or more Assistant Secretaries, if needed.
- 10. In order to expedite the conduct of business, no Resolutions of Substance (thus exempting Resolutions of Courtesy) shall be submitted to the Convention, except by the Committee on Dispatch of Business.

Conduct of Business

- 11. A delegate desiring recognition of the Chair shall indicate their need to speak by selecting the appropriate option in Zoom and give his/her name and the name of the church he/she represents.
- 12. A delegate making a report or debating shall indicate their need to speak by selecting the appropriate option in Zoom.
- 13. To expedite the business of the Convention, debates on any pending resolution or motion shall be limited to three minutes per speaker, and one person shall not speak more than once on the pending matter until all other persons who so desire have had an opportunity to be heard. No member shall speak more than two times to any one motion. The number of speakers for discussion shall be divided, as near as is practical, equally between the proponents and opponents of the pending subject.
- 14. A question having been decided shall not be reconsidered at the same Convention without the consent of two-thirds of the members present, nor without a motion for that purpose being made by one of the majority on the prior decision. No question shall be reconsidered more than once.
- 15. If required by the presiding officer, any motion shall not be considered as before the Convention unless reduced to writing.
- 16. In order to expedite the conduct of business, no proposed amendment to the Constitution or Canons shall be placed before the Convention.
- 17. When consideration of the proposed Diocesan Budget is before the Convention, each amendment thereto must (a) be submitted to the Treasurer in writing by the deadline published in the convention materilas, (b) indicate the specific line item(s) being increased and/or decreased, and (c) the aggregate dollar amount of changes proposed must be offsetting.

Reports

- 18. All reports, which have been printed and distributed in advance to all members of the Convention, shall be presented by title only and not read.
- 19. The budget materials prepared for Convention shall include both descriptions of line items and rationale for changes in funding or deletions of line items from the budget of the previous year.

Nominations

- 20. The Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint, not less than 60 days in advance of each Annual Convention, a Nominating Committee composed of four clergy and four lay persons resident in the Diocese, which shall report to the Convention nominations for all elective offices (other than those for which the bishop makes the nominations) in accordance with the following provisions:
- (a) Except as to the Office of Secretary, Trustee of the University of the South, and President of the Disciplinary Board, there shall be nominated not less than two nominees for each office.

- (b) There shall be obtained from each nominee presented his/her personal assurance of his/her willingness and availability to serve, if elected.
- (c) The name of each nominee shall be accompanied by suitable brief biographical data, including a listing of parish, mission, and diocesan offices then and previously held.
- (d) Suggestions as to persons for consideration shall be sought from parishes, missions, diocesan institutions, and individuals.
- (e) No further nominations for any office shall be made. No seconding speeches or endorsements of any candidate shall be allowed. A nominee (or in his/her absence at the Convention, the Rector of the nominee's Parish) may withdraw his/her name from consideration at any time.

Voting and Elections

- 21. When two or more equal positions are voted on simultaneously, a nominee must receive a majority of the total number of legal votes cast for such office. In the event a majority is received by more candidates than there are positions to be filled, those with the highest legal vote totals shall be elected.
- 22. In the election of persons wherein a concurring majority of both orders is required, in which only the number of persons required to fill the position or positions under consideration have been nominated, the Bishop, by unanimous consent of the Convention, may declare the candidates elected.
- 23. The Ecclesiastical Authority shall have the authority to appoint all Board Members, Trustees, and Committee Members, and fill other positions which are not required to be elected or otherwise selected by the Constitution or Canons of the Diocese of Dallas or any other lawful authority.
- 24. Voting will be conducted primarily by written ballot distributed in advance of the Annual Convention with a date for return of said ballot by mail, fax or email. No ballots received after this deadline shall be counted. Submission of a written ballot shall also constitute attendance at the meeting for quorum purposes. Any other voting required to be conducted at the meeting shall be conducted using the balloting feature of Zoom or equivalent option. The results of the elections will be reported to the Annual Convention by the Chair of the Elections Committee. The Elections Committee shall adopt procedures to maintain the confidentiality of all ballots and each member of the Elections Committee shall agree in writing to maintain such confidentiality.

Miscellaneous

- 25. The presiding officer, or such person as he may designate, shall be in charge of the admission of all media personnel. No recording of the Annual Convention shall be permitted by any means without the prior approval of the presiding officer.
- 26. The proceedings of the Convention shall be recorded via Zoom and permanently filed. The Journal of the Convention shall be reviewed and approved by a committee consisting of the Secretary, the Chancellor and the Parliamentarian.
- 29. Any of these rules may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of the delegates. These rules may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the delegates, provided such amendments are not in violation of the Constitution or Canons of the Diocese.
- 30. The Constitutions and Canons Committee shall be authorized to correct article, canon, and section designations, numbering, grammar, punctuation and cross-references and to make such other technical, typographical and conforming changes that will not change the meaning or intent of an amendment or resolution as may be necessary to reflect the intent of the Convention in approving the amendment or resolution.

 31. These rules of procedure shall apply only to the 2020 Annual Convention, and the prior approved rules shall be reinstated for the 2021 Annual Convention.

The Chair, the Rt. Rev. Dr. George R. Sumner, Bishop of Dallas, then offered his address.

Address to the 125th Annual Convention The Rt. Rev. George R. Sumner, Bishop, Diocese of Dallas

Before I begin, I want to express my appreciation to the Church of the Holy Cross for their hospitality in the use of their interior Garden of Contemplation, next to St. Francis, an appropriate place to speak with you in this season about our common life.

In the name of God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, Amen.

Forty years ago, as a new missionary of the Episcopal church placed in central Tanzania, in the late summer, I would occasionally see young men, their bodies painted white, jogging and singing alongside of the road. They were being initiated into manhood. And I should add, there were also traditions for young women who took on their responsibilities of adulthood. What did all that involve? First of all, they were separated – distanced, you might say – in the bush, and then they were tested. They had trials like those long runs under the African sun, and they were taught by their elders. What did it mean to be an adult member of the tribe? What kind of person ought you to be to meet that responsibility? As children, they had already been part of the tribe, but now they were to take that identity on themselves consciously. I should add that most of these young people were Christians and also at the same time underwent confirmation.

These young people were going through what the anthropologists call a Rite of Passage, and that ritual space in which it took place in between was named the liminal, which literally means the doorway. To get from here to there, we humans have to pass through, and there are steps to go across: distance, trial, teaching, claiming your true identity.

Actually, something similar happened in the early centuries of the Church. New members, prospective members, catechumens were separated. Remember, they had to leave before the Eucharist began – leave at the peace. There were trials like fasting and exorcism. They had to serve others. They were taught. This is, in fact, the origin of the season of Lent for us. Eventually they stood in church and recited back the Creed, leading to the glorious night at Easter Vigil when they were given and would receive their true identity as children of their Heavenly Father in Jesus and inheritors of the Kingdom of Heaven.

This morning, my dear friends, the Diocese of Dallas, I address you in this strange way because it is a strange

time. My message to you is this: what we as Christians are going through at this time is a kind of initiation. All the elements are here: distance, to be sure; testing and trial; for many, suffering; teaching in old formats and new by our faithful clergy in this Diocese. And all of this to the end that we claim anew what we already have – our identity as disciples of the crucified and risen Jesus Christ. That is what is really happening. Este es mi mensaje. Ahora nosotros como la gente de Dios no sentimos estar en un tipo de la iniciación. Aye todos los partes aquí: distancia por se puesto, pruebas y tentaciones la ensenyanda de nuestros pastores fieles para reclamar su identidad.

But you ask: didn't that initiation already happen for me in baptism. Of course it did, but the Christian life is reclaiming it, remembering it, seeing more of it, going deeper into it. We are already disciples. He was already a disciple – Peter - when he heard the words, "Do you love me? Feed my sheep. Come and follow." And so it is for us too – summon deeper and summon forward.

But wait a minute, Bishop, the time of COVID isn't some program of church formation. Isn't it really a random biological event, and as a result, a source of social and political strife – indeed, a health disaster? Isn't it a stressor for my family, and finally, a great question, mark over the future of all the churches? It is all these things, but it is also in the hand of God a summons to discipleship and as such a gift of grace. There is a theological principle here: God rules over everything, and He gives His world freedom, and He retains the power to order it, and He has the power to use even a pandemic for His loving purpose. Remember those words of Joseph to his brothers toward the end of the book of Genesis, "You intended me harm, but God intended it for good to accomplish what is now being done, the saving of many lives."

I want to offer this morning three things that Christian formation, which in the time of COVID, has taught us. Surely there are many more, but these three come to my mind. First, let me be clear – I don't want to have to be saying what I am saying this morning. I wish there were no COVID. I wish it would go away. It has upended all kinds of hopes and plans which we as a diocese had. Part of my objection is that COVID has been imposed on me. I have had to undergo it, and therefore it offends my sense of choice, will, and volition. I believe we all share some of that for it is a central part of our culture: choice and offense at what treads upon us from outside.

But compare this to the wisdom of the ancients. *Pathei-mathos*, *pathei-mathos*: it means in Greek "knowledge comes through suffering." We learn through what we undergo. That is what the great ancient Greek writer of tragedy Sophocles wrote about the hero Oedipus searching relentlessly for the truth that ended up spelling his own doom. Knowledge comes through suffering undergone. The ancient pagans believed that once you had this truth, your options as a human being were three: lose yourself in pleasure, clench your jaw with grim duty, or escape into a high vision divorced from the reality of the earth below. And that is why poor Oedipus put his own eyes out.

Those three same options are available in the secular post-modern pandemic world today. "Knowledge through suffering." The adage rings in our ears this season, but it means something very different for us as Christians. It takes on a different meaning. Let me drill down on that point for a moment. *Pathos* in Greek means something undergone, something you have passively submitted to. But it is not all passive, for we know how to undergo it; we can learn from it; and we can be a witness in the midst of it, and that matters. The root gives us the word passion, something we undergo, in this case suffering. Remember Jesus in His death – we refer to it as the Passion of our Lord, but it also gives us the word patience, the quality which a Christian can have as he or she endures.

You can see the important connection between *pathos*, passion, and patience. At the heart of our faith is the passion of Jesus, as I say. He submits himself even to death. It is at once passive and yet the greatest act of obedience, love and self-giving that is imaginable. That undergoing bears for us all our sins and sets us free. His passion makes possible our patience, our deliverance accomplished, the times all in the hand of King Jesus. You and I can follow the road then, though it be hard, which he has graciously opened up.

As an aside, you and I can find something similar in the old English word "suffering." It also had the meaning of submitting to something you undergo, as in the words, "suffer the little children to come unto me," although it often refers as well to pain. In short, we are being summoned in the most counter-cultural of ways to understand suffering and patience, which are now upon us in a deliberately Christian way.

Second of all, and from the beginning, we realized that we are a body. By this I mean, we are deeply mentally but physically interconnected. The virus assumes it since it wants to get from one body to the next. Neither individuality nor particular experience means anything to it. And the pandemic has ripped through every level and corner of society. To be sure, as it has done so, it has also revealed divisions and distinctions, for example, in access to healthcare. But in the midst of it all, we have seen how we need each other. We need most immediately the frontline worker, the nurse, the postal worker, and so on. We are quite literally in this together and in need of one another. Society made up not just of individuals, but itself a body, and what epidemiology and secular social reality show us, we realize to be all that much more true for us as Christians. It is taken up to a higher level. We are the body of Christ, the identity given to us in baptism and renewed by trial so that we can see this as our own nature, which we share and we can own.

Inertia is a social as well as a physical law. We grow accustomed, no less in the church as in the rest of society, to how things are. Our context real and less real the more distant context becomes from us. What if in the rite of passage called Pandemic, we were dislocated from the normal enough to see that we are in fact, in reality, a body in a more radical way. We are being summoned to see that we as church are a body: Episcopal churches with Roman Catholic and Watermark and Baptist and Pentecostal churches in South Dallas – all one. Jesus gives us no quarter. We are to be one as He and His Father are one.

What if in the midst of racial tension, disturbing realization of inequality, and moments of chaos, both left and right – what if the simple, profound gospel fact that we are already one in Christ, not in a general way, but really, bodily, as Baptist and Pentecostal, churches in South Dallas, and the Episcopal church, and in the city and town where you are across every racial, ethnic, denominational line, across habits of worship and across history. What if we started not with some political claim, but with the fact, made so by the word of Jesus, that we are one, already a body, so that we are compelled to work out its implications. And from the fact of the churches, a body, we could be witnesses of reconciliation in a society that desperately needs that witness.

As Christians, we work to alleviate hunger in our own townships, a good example being the Unite Project, which Deacon Smith and Carrie are working on, but there are many projects in other towns and cities because we are our brother or sister's keeper, being one body with them. The bread line is our distress and our problem. And finally, this being the 7th of November in the painfully divided year of 2020, we as Episcopalians are one body across our fractured political landscape. These are not options. These are not theories. These are implications of the solidarity that the initiation of pandemic thrusts upon us as by the hand of God.

The trial has been something imposed on us, but the baptismal passage is toward discipleship, toward your claiming the identity already yours, yours in baptism, yours that you share together with other sons and daughters of your Heavenly Father in His son, Jesus Christ. And that summons us onto a road together with him. COVID is nothing we asked for, but it summons us more deeply to claim who we have been: the body whose head is Christ, the company of followers of Jesus.

And on the road, we need to make our way, find the roadsides with a little bread for the journey, discovering how to survive and how to invite others in this strange time. COVID has been a straight and difficult time but also a time of ingenuity in our churches. Paul, in First Corinthians says "when we are tried, we are also shown

the means of escape so that we might endure." Constraint by the Holy Spirit can also provoke creativity. I have over these months seen such ways and means in our congregations: a network of Bible study and check in, a backyard church school, a cottage industry of masks, and a zoom Alpha, and on it goes. We enter a particularly demanding phase of the trial, our reserve of adaptation and creativity will be called upon anew.

At recent Executive Council and Standing Committee meetings, I posed the following question: "What if this is halftime, and we are now looking ahead to the second half until the vaccine." Now the good news here is that this upcoming demanding period will come to an end, but that moment is not quite yet. One of our clergy drew the implication that I, then, was the coach, a kind of ecclesial Bill Belichick as it were, and it would matter whether in the second half we were receiving our kicking off, whether we were on offense or defense. And if it were offense, coach, what is the strategy? It is a hard question for which I did not have an immediate or obvious answer.

Though a body, our congregations have different callings and charisms and contexts and challenges. We are talking about something deeper than a diocesan program, however well-intentioned, but pose this question to yourself this morning and imagine it being posed to you all as a congregation with this trial and separation and testing and teaching, as you put your ear to God's word. "What does the renewed baptismal summons sound like to you? What is radical discipleship as you rise up in the power of the Holy Spirit? What is that for you and your congregation?" If I turn away from my moments of discouragement and fatigue and turn toward radical discipleship together in the body and following after our Lord's footsteps, what is the shape of that, as I listen to His voice?

If all this were not only some sad and random interlude that I would escape, but if this is God who was working good out of evil in our society, in us, in us together, what shape does that have for us and for you as his radical disciple? In the spirit of another Saint in the time of plague, Francis, how does this make us instruments of peace, and what will that look like for you, singular and collective? I am told that after the flu pandemic of 1918, most Americans would not even mention it. It was simply too painful to remember. And yet, on the other hand, I remember from church history, after 1918, the pandemic led to movements of renewal in the Holy Spirit throughout the worldwide church. What if we allowed ourselves to be turned toward that second outcome, renewal in the broadest sense, individually and as a body, what would that look like? I suspect that each of us know the answer as the still small voice speaks it into out ear.

I feel like the errant preacher who late in the sermon realizes he'd better get around to the text. This year is the 125th anniversary of the founding of the diocese, and I liked that wonderful cover art the brochure has highlighting our founding Bishop Alexander Garrett. He was no stranger to disease in northeast Texas, catching typhoid and malaria as he traversed his area. I want to focus on the fact that he ministered on a new frontier. He was a traditional Anglo-Catholic, which implies the corporate nature of the church, as well as the fact that he was a minority within it. But there was nothing given about how he was to fulfill his ministry. Rather, he was a creative *impresario* for the gospel in our area. He had to find ways and means to be heard: a pump organ in the field, a lecture about astronomy in the pub. He faced into an uncertain second half of the time and place given from the hand of Jesus to him in which he was to be a radical disciple. A century and a quarter later, our situation is utterly different, not so different at all.

Thank God for him and for this often-confounding situation in which we in our perplexity have to invoke the Holy Spirit. Thanks for the good news that Christ can summon good out of ill and is summoning us through this trial to be here and now His servants to this end. Thank God for one another, the body, which we too often take for granted. Thanks be to God for your identity – baptismal in Christ – in which you and I are given the promise of resurrection with Him and are now summoned as *compañeros* of the Crucified One, by which we can hear His voice telling us what form our walk must take in the second half of this time, and then as we emerge into a landscape, which will be changed and daunting and full of opportunity, with the hand of Christ

over us, to whom we owe all praise here and now and in that coming day and in the years to come and unto eternity. Amen.

* * *

The Chair announced that the 125th Anniversary Celebration that had been scheduled for 2020 would be held in 2021.

The Chair then stated that the Racial Reconciliation Reading Group, led by the Rev. Matthew Burdette, had composed a resolution that that he would bring before Executive Council since no resolutions were allowed during the curtailed online Convention. The theological section from the middle of the resolution reads:

"Whereas the Holy Scripture reveals that every human being is created in the image of God and is thus endued with an essential and inalienable dignity, the divine demand for justice given to the prophets is particularly concerned with those who suffer at the hands of unjust legal systems administered by the powerful, and Jesus Christ through the atoning sacrifice of the cross, an inauguration of humanities' new creation in the resurrection, has broken down the barriers of hostility between all human beings, especially those based on race. Whereas through our baptism we take upon ourselves the sacred vocation of seeking and serving Christ in all persons, this includes honoring the witness of those who suffer, listening in humility to their testimony of injustice, and striving to address their needs."

The Chair announced that the offering for the 2020 Convention would be collected via text or check and go to the Greater Dallas Coalition to serve those poorest of the poor in South Dallas with food, toys, turkeys for Thanksgiving, etc.

BISHOP'S NOMINATIONS TO INSTITUTIONS, AGENCIES/BOARDS/COMMITTEES, COMMISSIONS

The Chair called on Bob Buchanan to report on nominations and appointments by the Bishop.

Mr. Buchanan made a motion to recess as the Diocesan Annual Meeting and convene as the Annual Meeting of the Corporation of the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas. There was a second, and the motion passed with a vote via Zoom.

Mr. Buchanan directed delegates to page 8 of the Convention Booklet. The election for those nominated was part of the paper ballot distributed prior to Convention.



Ms. LaCour moved that the budget change be accepted. No second was required as the motion had previously been approved by the Finance Committee. Motion carried.

Ms. Susan Mills, Missioner for Diocesan Services, announced that, due to the Diocese's five-year loss history of 140%, Church Insurance (CIC) would be raising deductibles for all entities to the following:

- Tornado, Wind & Hail 1% of building value or \$10,000 (whichever is greater)
- Property \$10,000

Additionally, depending on an entity's individual five-year loss history, premiums would be increased between 5%-13%. It was the recommendation of the Diocesan Insurance Committee that the premium increases "be flattened" to 8% for all entities. Ms. Mills also announced that CIC was offering a 3% reduction in premium to any entity participating in CIC's new Alacrity Program. It was the recommendation of the Diocesan Insurance Committee that all entities be enrolled in the Alacrity Program with parishes being given the option to opt-out & missions/mission stations eligible to opt-out with the permission of the Bishop. The Finance Committee endorsed both recommendations. Ms. Pat Bostian moved that the both the 8% premium increase & the enrollment of all entities in the Alacrity Program be approved as recommended. Ms. Misty Keasler seconded. Discussion followed. Motion carried.

Ms. Sonom was recognized & thanked for her outstanding service to the Diocese as Treasurer. Bishop Sumner introduced Mr. Greg Fox & Ms. Alison Fox, who will be our Treasurer team. Mr. Fox will be serving in the official capacity as Diocesan Treasurer.

March 2020

No meeting was held.

REPORTS TO THE 126th ANNUAL MEETING Saturday, November 6, 2021

April 14, 2020 (via Zoom)

The financial reports for February & March 2020 were presented. Mr. Ellis moved that the financial reports be accepted. No second was required as the reports had previously been accepted by the Finance Committee. Motion carried.

Assessment adjustment requests from Good Samaritan (Dallas) & St. William Laud (Pittsburg) were presented. Good Samaritan is requesting a reduction from \$5,609 to \$4,487. St. William Laud is requesting a reduction from \$11,545 to \$10,145. The recommendation of the Finance Committee to Executive Council is that these requests be denied & Congregational Development grants be awarded in the amounts of \$1,122 to Good Samaritan & \$1,400 to St. William Laud.

An assessment adjustment request from St. Anne (DeSoto) was presented. St. Anne is requesting a reduction from \$38,886 to \$26,886. The recommendation of the Finance Committee to Executive Council is that the request be denied & a meeting scheduled between the parish leadership & the Canon to the Ordinary.

An assessment adjustment request from St. Philip's (Frisco) was presented. St. Philip's is requesting a reduction from \$196,687 to \$160,090 (a total reduction of \$36,597). The recommendation of the Finance Committee to Executive Council is that this request be approved.

A request for permission to revise the 2018 Parochial Report for Holy Nativity (Plano) was presented. The parish's Normal Operating Income (Line A) was overstated by \$51,942. A correction to this entry would decrease the parish's 2020 assessment from \$47,729 to \$41,496 (a total reduction of \$6,233). The recommendation of the Finance Committee to Executive Council is that this request be approved.

An assessment adjustment request from Holy Nativity (Plano) was presented. Holy Nativity is requesting a reduction from the corrected amount of \$41,496 to \$20,748 (a total reduction of \$20,748). The recommendation of the Finance Committee to Executive Council is that this request be approved.

Mr. Ellis moved that all recommendations of the Finance Committee for assessment adjustment requests be accepted. Ms. Misty Keasler seconded. Motion carried.

A banking resolution removing Michael Gilton and adding Alan Dunlop was proposed. The Revd Craig Reed moved that the resolution be approved. No second was required as the resolution had previously been approved by the Finance Committee. Motion carried.

Mr. Fox presented a recommendation from the Finance Committee that the Diocese apply for a loan under the terms of the CARES ACT Paycheck Protection Program ("PPP"). Mr. Ellis moved that the recommendation of the Finance Committee be accepted. Ms. Keasler seconded. Motion carried.

Bishop Sumner requested that the amount set aside in the 2020 budget for "Support of the Broader Episcopal Church" (\$463,878 - approximately 12% of the Diocese's Assessment Revenue) be sent, in its entirety, to support the Budget of the General Convention & that the full assessment (15% of Diocesan Revenues) be paid in 2021. Ms. LaCour moved that the request be approved. Mr. Ellis seconded. Motion carried.

May 12, 2020 (via Zoom)

The financial reports for April 2020 were presented. Mr. Ellis moved that the financial reports be accepted. No second was required as the reports had previously been accepted by the Finance Committee. Motion carried.

A revised 2020 budget, recommended by the Finance Committee & reflecting the decrease in assessment revenue due to the "forgiveness" of the April payments & the expense cuts necessitated, was presented. Mr. Ellis moved that the revised budget be accepted as presented. Mr. Craig Fowler seconded. Motion carried.

June 9, 2020 (via Zoom)

The financial reports for May 2020 were presented. Mr. Ellis moved that the financial reports be accepted. No second was required as the reports had previously been accepted by the Finance Committee. Motion carried.

A housing resolution for The Revd Logan Hurst was presented. Mr. Craig Fowler moved that the resolution be approved. Ms. Pat Bostian seconded. Motion carried.

A request from Christ Church (Dallas) for permission to sell a condominium left to the parish by The Revd A. Harrison Lee was submitted. Ms. Misty Keasler moved that permission be granted. Ms. LaCour seconded. Motion carried.

COLLEGE OF DEACONS

2020

The College of Deacons is an essential ministry in the diocese, called to model servant ministry for others, to interpret to the Church the needs, concerns, and hopes of the world. Deacons are called to engage members of the church in the mission of meeting the needs, sharing the concerns and kindling the hopes of others. Deacons live into this call in a wide variety of ways.

Some deacons serve on the bishop's staff, and on diocesan councils and commissions. For example, Deacon Mark Hall serves as the Diocesan Deacon for Outreach and Social Justice (appointed by Bishop Sumner in 2017). His charge is to facilitate EDOD parishes in reaching out to our brothers and sisters in Christ through the Greater Dallas Coalition, and to serve as a resource for outreach ministry generally in EDOD. Deacon Jennifer Smith was appointed by Bishop Sumner this year to work with Carrie Headington as head of the racial healing, justice and reconciliation commission. She also, along with other medical personnel, provided the Bishop with medical information to help navigate the COVID waters. Some deacons are active in Kairos ministry, some serve as hospital chaplains, and some have served as deans for summer camp at Camp All Saints. Deacons are participants and leaders in both domestic and world-wide mission efforts and active in the Dallas community on boards and commissions. Deacons are retreat leaders and community gardeners; deacons are involved in healing ministries like Community of Hope and Stephen Ministry. In their parishes, deacons help organize outreach activities, are leaders in Christian education (Education for Ministry, Christian Formation, Bible Study), and offer pastoral care to the sick and the homebound. Deacons accompany the bishops on visitations to the parishes.

The annual deacons' meeting with the bishop was held at the Diocesan Office on February 1, 2020. Bishop Sumner led a discussion of a reading from Miroslav Volf and then celebrated Eucharist with us. 17 of the 21 currently active deacons were present. Following lunch, each deacon shared about their ministry, their joys and their challenges.

In the first week of March, Rosemary represented our diocese at the AED Archdeacons Conference in Jacksonville, Florida. Many good ideas were shared about helping all members of our dioceses be aware of the role of deacons and also encouraging folks to discern possible calls to the diaconate. That was the last weekend before COVID shut things down!

At the AED Conference, Rosemary participated in plans with other archdeacons in our province to have a Province VII deacons meeting. Instead of being an in-person experience, plans were altered, and we gathered in July and again in August by Zoom, with over 30 deacons gathered each time. Plans were made to hold a Preaching Conference for Deacons of Province VII, presented by the Episcopal Preaching Foundation. This event was held Sept 26-27, and more than 25 deacons from across Province VII participated in the zoom conference, including 5 from our Diocese. In August and September Rosemary lead our diocesan deacons in a discussion of Latasha Morrison's book, "Be the Bridge," a study of systemic racism in our country and ways we can begin the conversations needed to move towards racial reconciliation.

In November, in response to the two hurricanes that hit back-to-back in Honduras, Archdeacon Rosemary, in collaboration with Carol Taylor, Jamey Ryan, and other members of the St. Luke's Honduras Mission Team, organized the gathering of clothes, household goods, health and food supplies to be sent to Bishop Lloyd Allen in Honduras. There was a wonderful response diocesan wide, and a full container was shipped to Honduras in December.

Because of COVID, we were unable to hold a deacon's retreat this year. Rosemary and Deacon Jennifer Smith, along with Carrie Headington, helped organize a conference "The Cost of COVID", presented in cooperation with UNITE, and presented by Zoom to all clergy the day before Diocesan Convention.

This year, Bishop visitations ceased in March because of COVID, so only 7 visits were made by deacons accompanying the bishop. As of December, we have 22 active deacons (5 not canonically resident) and 4 retired deacons in the diocese.

COMMISSION ON MINISTRY

2020

The Commission on Ministry (COM) fulfills the canonical requirement to advise the Bishop in the implementation of Title III.6 and III.8 of the Canons of The Episcopal Church, in the determination of the present and future needs for ministry, and in the design and oversight of the process for recruitment, discernment, formation, and assessment of persons for ministry.

The Commission conducted 9 meetings over the course of the year to examine and interview those responding to a call for Holy Orders. Those sessions included:

- hosted 7 aspirants at the annual discernment retreat,
- interviewed 9 nominees for postulancy
- interviewed 5 postulants for candidacy
- interviewed 1 candidates for Diaconate
- interviewed 1 deacons for the priesthood
- there was 1 candidate examined by the Board of Examining Chaplains, a sub-committee of the Commission.

The Commission is a dedicated group of 18 members plus 2 Ex-Officio members from across the diocese. I thank the members of COM for their commitment of time, their prayers, and their dependence on our Lord for discernment for all ministry vocations both ordained and lay. It is with great pleasure I serve as chair to this group under the direction of our bishop.

Additionally, the Congregational Development ministry of the Diocese assisted various congregations in clergy recruitment and deployment and in negotiating diverse challenges in program, congregational dynamics, and COVID-protocol compliance.

CONVENTION ARRANGEMENTS COMMITTEE

2020

The Rt. Reverend George Sumner selected the theme for the 2020 Convention: Our Ancient – Modern Future: "Ride Like Cowboys, Pray Like Saints, Preach Like Apostles" -The Right Rev. Alexander Garrett

The Planning Committee for the 125th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Dallas began preparation meetings in May of 2020 with a detailed timeline of events submitted to guide our work. Given the prevalence of COVID-19 in Texas it was determined that a special committee be appointed to guide us through alternatives to an in-person Convention for 2020. The newly formed committee was chaired by David Parsons and included the Rev. Michael Mills, Tim Mack, Ellen Williamson, Bob Buchanan, the Rev. Robert Price, and Mark & Terry Demler.

The Special Committee working in conjunction with the Planning Committee of The Rt. Rev. George Sumner, The Rev. Robert Price, Virginia Wider, Amy Wooten, Ticoy Young, Susan Mills, Kim Lanore, Laura Faulkner, Kimberly Durnan, and Co-Chairs Mark and Terry Demler made the decision to hold a virtual Convention via Zoom on Saturday, November 7, 2020.

The responsibilities of these Committees were to satisfy the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese while keeping the health and welfare of Convention attendees in our plans.

On September 3, 2020, a final Rules of Procedure was published that guided our actions for the virtual Convention. In addition to the Rules of Procedure, it was decided that initial ballots for Convention nominations and budget approvals would be distributed in advance of the Convention to expedite the proceeding in the virtual Convention.

On November 7, 2020, the 125th Diocesan Convention began with Morning Prayer and a sermon by The Rt. Rev. Lloyd Allen. The Convention was then called to order and the Rules of Procedure, Credentials, and Agenda were adopted.

The first virtual Convention of The Diocese of Dallas was conducted as planned and positive feedback was received from Convention Delegates and Clergy for the content and brevity of the proceedings. Considering the extraordinary circumstances, the 2020 EDOD Convention was considered very successful!

CURATE DEVELOPMENT

2020

During the program year, our diocesan curates gather each month to discuss and think theologically about some aspect of ministry, led by one of our diocesan clergy or another guest leader and focused by assigned reading. On the whole, we in EDOD are able to place and train more curates for future ministry than most dioceses, which is a blessing for our diocese and for the wider church.

EPISCOPAL CENTER FOR RENEWAL

2020

The Episcopal Center for Renewal cancelled all retreats for the year 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. During the year, we began work on a video series, which is planned to be completed in 2021. In 2020, the Center took in \$8,935 and incurred expenses of \$6,771. The majority of the expenses supported down payments for future retreats, office expenses, and video production costs. The Center has \$2,321 in the General Fund and \$37,643 designated for Renewal in the Diocese of Dallas. We hope to resume operations in late 2021 or 2022.

EPISCOPAL FOUNDATION OF DALLAS

2020

Organization

The Episcopal Foundation of Dallas ("the Foundation") was established by the Diocesan Convention of 1950. It is organized as a Texas non-profit corporation and is qualified as a Section 501(c) (3) exempt organization. The Foundation exists to strengthen and support faith communities by partnering wise investments with purposeful giving. It offers investment management services within the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas and supports organizations within the Diocese through its annual grant program. The Foundation is professionally managed and is governed by a Board of Trustees, all of whom are committed to good stewardship, prudent investment and faithful disbursement of the funds entrusted to the Foundation. The Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas serves as an ex officio member of the board.

Investment Services

The Foundation's investment management services are available to any parish, mission, school or other non-profit Episcopal organization in the Diocese.

All investment assets are pooled and invested according to a diversified asset allocation described in our investment policy. This structure creates an opportunity for clients to invest at reduced fees not otherwise available to smaller investors. The portfolio includes actively- and passively-managed mutual funds, diversified both as to fixed income and equity holdings with an aim of long-term growth. Members of the Investment and Finance committee have decades of experience in multiple investment institutions are responsible for the supervision of the portfolio of the Foundation.

Donor Advised Funds

The Foundation is now offering individuals a way to direct and manage their charitable contributions through donor-advised funds. Creating a fund with EFD allows individuals an economical way to focus on their charitable giving without the burden of paperwork or grant administration. The Foundation staff is available to assist in identifying grant opportunities within the Dioceses if needed.

The Foundation's Episcopal Fund generates income for annual grants that benefit the entire Diocesan community. Annual Grant Program

The Foundation's annual grant program exists to support the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas, its churches, schools and agencies – that means you! Our particular emphasis is toward funding programs or ministries that address the problems of poverty, homelessness, and food insecurity but Diocesan entities may apply for other needs as well. Since inception, the Foundation has awarded over \$6 million to the Diocesan community.

In February 2020, the Foundation pledged \$200,000 to the Diocese to support parishes in need of operating support as result of the COVID-19 crisis. These grants were made available through an application to the Diocese. In June 2020, the Foundation awarded an additional \$142,500 through its own annual grant program. There were 23 grants benefitting parishes, schools and non-profits throughout the Diocese.

The Foundation's sister foundation, the Episcopal Health Foundation of Dallas, which is managed by the same Board has its own annual grant program. The primary purpose of the Episcopal Health Foundation is to provide funding for medical care, medical research, and medical education. The Episcopal Health Foundation has awarded over \$8 million in grants since its inception. Applications and information are available on our website.

2020

2020 has marked an unprecedented opportunity for the church to engage in mission as our world was ravaged by the COVID-19 pandemic. Our communities in North Texas and beyond have experienced poverty, division and despair at levels we have not seen in our life time. The parishes of the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas have been hard at work this past year, sharing the good news of Jesus Christ in word and deed, locally, nationally and internationally. They have brought hope and healing to many in need physically, emotionally, and spiritually.

The mission of the EDOD Evangelism Initiative is to resource and come alongside congregations in the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas to continue their dynamic work of personal and parish evangelism. This past year we have done this through the following work:

- 1. Evangelism Workshops, Retreats and Consultations. Canon Carrie Headington has led evangelism workshops, trainings, adult education forums, and vestry retreats online (via zoom) this past year for EDOD parishes. She has also provided consulting for parishes as they seek to share good news in word and action. Additionally, she has served as guest preacher for numerous parishes throughout the year.
- 2. <u>EDOD Online Alpha Course: Fall 2020</u>. The Episcopal Diocese of Dallas ran an online Alpha course in the Fall 2020 with 17 EDOD parishes participating. This online opportunity provided a space for Episcopalians to invite their non-Christian and seeking friends to explore questions of life, faith, and meaning. We had over 100 participants.
- 3. PROJECT US: Unite and Serve. Project US: Unite and Serve is the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas' initiative to serve the least of these (Matthew 25) as one body (John 17). The needs of our communities and especially the poor have been exacerbated this past year due to the global pandemic. As a result, EDOD came together to be good news in action for our region. This has been carried out through the following diocesan-wide projects:
 - a. Bishop Sumner Monthly Food Grants: EDOD distributed monthly grants to parishes and ministries which fed the hungry throughout 2020. EDOD parishes (and ecumenical partners through the local churches of the Greater Dallas Coalition) have distributed over 1 million pounds of food for hungry families this past year. At each out the outreaches, prayer was also provided.
 - b. Poverty Awareness: Cost of COVID. EDOD hosted 2 online trainings which outlined the impact of COVID on those living in poverty in our region.
 - c. EDOD Online Giving: Provided toys for homeless children at Christmas and Turkeys at Thanksgiving.
 - d. Dallas Champions Academy: The Dallas Champions Academy is dedicated to the flourishing of children and youth in South Dallas physically, emotionally, academically, and spiritually. The mission was carried out this past year through an online Summer Academy (140 student participants), an online College Fair, and 10 Steps to University from which 50 high school seniors from South Dallas found placement and financial aid to college and online year-round mentoring.
 - e. Racial Reconciliation Reading Group. Clergy and laity throughout EDOD participated in an online reading group led by Deacon Jennifer Smith and read. *Rediscipling the White Church* by David Swanson. Deacon Jennifer was named the Racial Reconciliation, Healing, and Justice Commission Chair which created resources for parishes.
- **4.** <u>Harvest Prayer Network.</u> This EDOD network of intercessors held bi-weekly calls to cover the Diocese, our programs, parishes, and leadership in prayer. EDOD also hosted the Ecumenical Prayer Gathering for the Citywide Day of Prayer led by the Mayor of Dallas.
- 5. <u>Lay Order of Evangelists</u>. 4 new lay evangelists were commissioned in the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas. These students received formation through the Stanton School for Ministry. All lay evangelists are equipped to serve their local parish in evangelistic work.

HOLY FAMILY SCHOOL

2020

Founded in 1951 as a mission of the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas, Holy Family School in McKinney, Texas continued to serve the children of our community in 2020. The original vision of Father Jose and Dr. Maria Luisa Vega was to prepare the young children of migrant farm workers academically, physically and socially for public school.

Holy Family is housed in the former E.S. Doty High School building, which served as the place of public education for Collin County's African American children during segregation. Today, Holy Family honors and promotes the important educational and cultural legacy of our building, and strives to carry on the Vegas' crucial mission of making quality early childhood education accessible for all children within our diverse community. God has continued to work at this little school for over 70 years.

Sadly, the pandemic significantly affected enrollment. Our numbers went down from approximately 65 children in 2019 to 35 children. We were closed briefly for two weeks due to several staff members needing to quarantine, but otherwise we remained open to serve our families the entire year. We were forced to temporarily discontinue our infant program due to lack of demand during COVID, so we now serve children ages 18 months to 5.

During the lockdown period of the pandemic, only 12 of our students were children of essential workers. We remained open for months with only those 12 children in attendance. We distributed food and hygiene items from our parking lot, and delivered to those unable to pick up. Our circle drive in front of the school served as the location for many socially distant drive through birthday parties in the neighborhood, and we were in regular communication with our families checking on our students and promoting various online events and discussions held by the diocese and others.

Once we were able to fully open our doors again, our enrollment numbers have grown steadily but it has been a slow process. We continue to distribute food weekly to our students, friends and neighbors in need. We are excited about the upcoming opening of our neighbor Community Garden Kitchen, and we are eager to partner with them to further address the problem of food insecurity in our area. We hope to resume care for infants and look forward to many more of our beloved students returning in the near future. New students are consistently enrolling weekly, so we feel confident that there continues to be a need for the Vegas' decades old mission of providing affordable and quality early childhood education for all in our community.

Our community partners include McKinney Roots, Collin County Meals on Wheels, McKinney Housing Authority, Community Lifeline, The Samaritan Inn, McKinney Hunger Free Coalition, North Texas Food Bank, The Alliance for Elite Youth Leadership (AEYL), The Allen Americans, One Heart McKinney, The Goddard School and as mentioned previously our neighbors at the Community Garden Kitchen. Together with our many valued friends and partners, we are committed to making sure that the children in our care have access to the very best educational opportunities, regardless of their parents' ability to pay. We embrace our rich cultural background and we celebrate our neighborhood's diversity. With the continued vital support of the EDOD, Holy Family School looks forward to many more years of ministry and service to the children of McKinney.

It is an honor to be able to provide this attention and this ministry for our clergy families.

RURAL CHURCH DEVELOPMENT

2020

Unfortunately, the work of the Canon on behalf of our rural church communities, as is a major portion of the diocese, was restricted in its ability to function in its normal capacity during the past year. During the first quarter of the year weekly visits with the various rural congregations went unhampered and I had the opportunity to visit, preach and or celebrate in several of our rural churches.

Because of the COVID pandemic, we were unable to hold our annual Rural Church Gathering nor the Rural Clergy Gathering. While we looked into various ways to conduct these two events, which have been well attended in the past, we were unable to come up with a workable method for gathering a large number of people together in a meaningful way.

As churches began to be required to shut down, physical contact with our rural churches became impossible, so we were forced to rely on Zoom meetings, email and phone conversations. Through the balance of the year, I was amazed and pleasantly surprised to discover the many various ways that our rural clergy and their congregations found to use social media to maintain and continue much of their ministry. The methods used was as varied as are our various congregations and yet Bible study, the Daily Offices, worship services and even confirmation classes were provided along with other meaningful activities.

While this year proved to be challenge, our rural clergy have risen to the occasion in an attempt to show their congregations that the day to day life of the church is, in fact, essential to maintaining the spiritual stability of our church families. Hopefully, we will never be asked to face this kind of challenge again any time in the future.

VOCATIONS

2020

In 2020, we gave varying levels of financial support to ten seminarians, seven of whom were enrolled at Wycliffe College at the University of Toronto, two Nashotah House and one Trinity School for Ministry. Our commitment is to pay seminary tuition for students whom we send off to seminary, and we attempt to provide limited financial support to students already in seminary who begin discerning a call with our diocese. Of those ten, six were attending a three-year full-time residential program, one was pursuing distance learning, and four were pursuing distanced education while being mentored locally. In addition to those ten financially supported seminarians, we had fifteen other discerners at varying stages of the process. We are blessed in the diocese of Dallas with far more ordinands than most other dioceses of comparable size, and I am deeply encouraged by their faith and passion for Gospel ministry.

Note 1 - Description of Diocese

The Episcopal Diocese of Dallas of the Protestant Episcopal Church (the Diocese) is an unincorporated association, which complies with the Constitution and Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America (ECUSA) and recognizes the authority of the General Convention of the Church. The Diocese includes a 25-county area in Northeast Texas. The Bishop of the Diocese of Dallas (the Bishop) has jurisdiction over all affiliated organizations within the Diocese, including parishes, missions, schools, and other charitable organizations and funds.

The Endowment of the Episcopate (the EOE) is a trust that was set up and segregated to own and manage investments that provide income for the compensation of the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, and the Bishop Suffragan. The Constitution of the Diocese requires an endowment fund to be managed and controlled by a Board of Trustees appointed by the Bishop. After paying the necessary expenses incident to the management of the EOE, such portion of the EOE and the earnings thereof, as determined by the Board of Trustees (not to take more from the principal than seven percent of its value at the beginning of the year), are applied annually toward the compensation of the Bishop of the Diocese, and of the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, and of the Suffragan Bishops, if there be any, or for other expenses of the Office of the Bishop or general Diocesan purposes.

The Diocese assumed management of the All Saints Camp and Conference Center (the Camp) in 2010. Consequently, under accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP), the financial position, activities and changes in net assets, and cash flows of the Camp are consolidated with those of the Diocese. The Camp is considered an evangelism and outreach program.

As the Diocese, the EOE, and the Camp, collectively referred to hereafter as the Diocese, are under common control; these financial statements have been consolidated to reflect the results of all three organizations.

The Corporation of the Episcopal Diocese (the Corporation) is a separate not-for-profit entity and was formed to hold title to all the real estate occupied by the various parishes and missions within the 25-county Diocese. In most cases, the Corporation holds nominal title to the property with the individual parish being the beneficial titleholder.

Principles of Consolidation

These financial statements include the accounts of the Diocese (Operating Funds and Special Funds), consolidated with the EOE, and the Camp. These consolidated financial statements are the responsibility of the Diocese's management. These accounting policies conform to U.S. GAAP and have been consistently applied in the preparation of the consolidated financial statements.

All significant inter-entity transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Description of Net Assets

Net assets are classified based on existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions as follows:

Without Donor Restrictions – Consists of resources of the Diocese that have not been restricted by a donor. The major sources of revenue are parish assessments, Camp programs and activities, and investment income. The Board designated net assets for the Operating Funds of \$938,878 are more than the total net assets for the Operating Funds of \$597,711 due to the unfunded position on postretirement benefits of \$645,828.

With Donor Restrictions – Defined as the portion of net assets that have a restriction on the specific use or the occurrence of a certain future event. Net assets consisting of the initial fair value of the gifts where the donor has specified the assets donated are to be retained in an endowment, providing a permanent source of revenue for charitable purposes, are classified as with donor restrictions. The accumulation of assets (above historic gift value) in donor restricted endowment funds is classified as with donor restrictions until appropriated for use based on the Diocese's spending policy. When the purpose restriction is accomplished, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported as net assets released from restrictions.

Estimates

Management uses estimates and assumptions in preparing financial statements. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, and reported revenues and expenses. Significant estimates used in preparing these consolidated financial statements include those assumed in recording depreciation, postretirement benefits, and the value of investments and notes receivable. It is at least reasonably possible that the significant estimates used will change within the next year.

Functional Expense Allocations

Expenses are allocated among program services and management and generally based on management's estimate of time spent on these functions by specific employees. The remaining costs are charged directly to the appropriate functional category.

Major Programs

Congregation support & development – Operating grants to existing congregations needing financial assistance to sustain their ministries. Financial support for ongoing efforts to plant new churches. Funding for work of the Diocesan leadership and personnel to further the vision of the Diocesa.

Clergy support & development – Support for development of seminarians, curates, and existing clergy, including both financial and personnel resources and including theological research and development.

Evangelism & outreach – Funding for spreading the gospel throughout the Diocese and beyond its geographical boundaries.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Support of the wider Episcopal Church – Financial support for The Episcopal Church's General Convention as well as other ministries outside the Diocese of Dallas.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Diocese classifies all unrestricted demand deposits, money market funds, and highly liquid debt investments with an initial maturity of three months or less as cash and cash equivalents. Cash and cash equivalents designated for investment are classified as investments.

Receivables and Deferred Revenue from Programs

Receivables from programs represent amounts due from attendees of Camp programs and activities. Deferred revenue from programs represents advance payments to the Camp for programs and activities to be conducted in 2020.

Investments

Investments are recorded at their estimated fair value at the date of the consolidated financial statements. Investment transactions are recorded on their trade date. Unrealized and realized gains and losses are included in the consolidated statements of activities and changes in net assets. Interest income is recognized on the accrual basis and dividends are recognized on the ex-dividend date.

Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; that is, an exit price. The exit price assumes the asset or liability is exchanged in an orderly transaction, and it is not a forced liquidation or distressed sale.

Assets and liabilities measured at fair value are classified in a hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques giving the highest priority to readily available unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements) when market prices are not readily available or reliable. The valuation levels are not necessarily an indication of the risk or liquidity associated with the underlying investment. The three levels of the hierarchy are described below:

Level 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Diocese has the ability to access. Valuation adjustments and block discounts are not applied to Level 1 instruments. Since valuations are based on quoted prices that are readily and regularly available in an active market, valuation of these products does not entail a significant degree of judgment.

Level 2 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are based on directly or indirectly observable inputs such as quoted prices for similar assets in active markets and quoted prices in markets that are not active.

Level 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable, significant to the fair value measurement, and reflect significant management judgment.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

The Diocese's consolidated statements of financial position includes the following financial instruments that are required to be measured at fair value on a recurring basis:

 Investments held at the Episcopal Foundation of Dallas (the Foundation) are reported at fair value based on the fair value of the underlying assets in the funds as reported by the Foundation. The investments utilize the net asset value of the fund as a practical expedient to estimate the fair value.

Inventories

Camp inventories are stated at the lower of cost or market. Cost is determined by the first-in, first-out (FIFO) method.

Notes Receivable

The Diocese provides low-interest rate loans to organizations within the Diocese. These loans are stated at the principal balance and are due under various terms. Interest income is recognized when earned; however, accrual of interest is discontinued when an allowance for collectability is reserved against a loan. The Diocese examines all loans on an individual basis to determine the likelihood of collection and the need to provide an allowance for any uncollectible amounts. The Diocese has discretion regarding any borrower unable to meet its payments during the year, and may elect to write-off loans to assist these borrowers or extend the loan.

Land, Property, and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at cost when purchased or at fair value as of the date of the gift when donated. Major expenditures in excess of \$2,500 and those which substantially increase the useful lives of the assets are capitalized. Maintenance, repairs, and replacements, which do not improve or extend the lives of the respective assets, are charged to operations when incurred. When property and equipment is sold or otherwise disposed of, the asset and related accumulated depreciation is removed, and any gain or loss is included in operations. Donated assets are reported as unrestricted support unless the donor has restricted the asset for a specific purpose. Assets donated with explicit restrictions regarding their use and contributions of cash that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as with donor restrictions support.

Absent donor stipulations regarding how long those donated assets must be maintained, the Diocese reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service as instructed by the donor. The Diocese reclassifies with donor restrictions net assets to without donor restrictions net assets at that time.

Depreciation is calculated using the straight-line method at rates sufficient to amortize the related costs over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets. Estimated useful lives range from 3 to 40 years.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Long-Lived Assets

The Diocese assesses potential impairments to its long-lived assets (primarily property and equipment) when there is evidence that events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of an asset may not be recovered. An impairment loss is recognized when the undiscounted cash flows expected to be generated by an asset (or group of assets) is less than its carrying amount. Any required impairment loss is measured as the amount by which the asset's carrying value exceeds its fair value and is recorded as a reduction in the carrying value of the related asset and a charge to operating results. There were no long-lived assets that were impaired at December 31, 2020 and 2019.

Postretirement Benefits

The Diocese estimates its postretirement benefit costs and obligations associated with its Medicare Supplement Plan using various actuarial assumptions and methodologies. Assumptions include the current discount rate, expected costs of the plan over time, and mortality rates. To assist in developing these assumptions and estimates, the Diocese uses the services of an independent actuary. Although the Diocese believes that the assumptions used are appropriate, differences between assumed and actual experience may affect the Diocese's operating results.

Revenues and Support

The Executive Council of the Diocese has the authority to assess the parishes and missions for support of the budget as established by the annual Diocesan Convention. The Diocese receives a substantial portion of its revenues from assessments on parishes and missions within the Diocese. Assessments receivable at the balance sheet date represent amounts due from various parishes and missions. No amounts are considered uncollectible as the Diocese fully expects to collect these amounts. Any excess assessments at year-end are retained by the Diocese for use in the succeeding year.

Contributions are comprised of revenue from gifts, grants, and bequests. Contributions are considered to be without donor restriction unless they are specifically restricted by the donor. Contributions designated for future periods or restricted by the donor for specific purposes or in perpetuity are reported as contributions with donor restrictions.

Camp revenue is considered to be without donor restriction. Revenue from Camp programs is recognized at the time participants attend the program or activity at the Camp.

Income Taxes

The Diocese, the EOE, and the Camp are not-for-profit organizations that are exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

U.S. GAAP requires management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Diocese and recognize a tax liability if the Diocese has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the U.S. federal, state, or local tax authorities.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

The Diocese has analyzed their tax positions and has concluded that as of December 31, 2020 and 2019, there are no uncertain positions taken, or expected to be taken, that would require recognition of a liability or disclosure in the consolidated financial statements.

Recent Accounting Pronouncements

In September 2020, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No. 2020-07, *Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958) – Presentation and Disclosures by Not-for-Profit Entities for Contributed Nonfinancial Assets*, to improve generally accepted accounting principles by increasing the transparency of contributed nonfinancial assets for not-for-profit entities through enhancement to presentation and disclosure. This update is effective for annual periods beginning after June 15, 2021, and interim periods within annual periods beginning after June 15, 2022. The Diocese is currently assessing the potential impact of this ASU on its consolidated financial statements.

Risks and Uncertainties

In December 2019, a novel strain of coronavirus (COVID-19) surfaced in Asia and has spread around the world, with resulting business and social disruption. The coronavirus was declared a Public Health Emergency of International Concern by the World Health Organization on January 30, 2020. The outbreak of COVID-19 continues to adversely affect global commercial activity and has contributed to significant volatility in the financial markets. The extent to which the coronavirus may impact the Foundation's investment results will depend on future developments, which are highly uncertain and cannot be predicted, including new information which may emerge concerning the severity of the coronavirus and the actions required to contain the coronavirus or treat its impact, among others. The duration and economic impact of the outbreak is uncertain but could have a material impact to Diocese's liquidity; see also Note 3. As of December 31, 2020, the impact to the Diocese has been minimal but included closures to the Camp for a period of time.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events are events or transactions that occur after the consolidated statement of financial position date but before the consolidated financial statements are available to be issued. The Diocese recognizes in the consolidated financial statements the effects of all subsequent events that provide additional evidence about conditions that existed at the date of the consolidated statement of financial position, including the estimates inherent in the process of preparing the consolidated financial statements. The Diocese's consolidated financial statements do not recognize subsequent events that provide evidence about conditions that did not exist at the date of the consolidated statement of financial position but arose after the consolidated statement of financial position date and before the consolidated financial statements are available to be issued (see Note 15).

Note 3 - Liquidity and Availability

The Diocese reserves the right to transfer funds from the Board designed reserves, as needed, as approved by the Board.

In addition to financial assets available to meet general expenditures over the next 12 months, the Diocese operates with a balanced budget and anticipates assessments to cover general expenditures; see also Note 14.

Funds invested with the Foundation are part of the Foundation's diversified portfolio of cash, fixed income securities, marketable equity securities, and alternative investments. This investment is valued based upon the Diocese's pro rata interest in the Foundation's agency investment funds (approximately 19% and 19% at December 31, 2020 and 2019, respectively). This investment seeks to preserve assets through an investment return sufficient to offset inflation and enhance, where possible, assets through an investment return sufficient to achieve payout objectives and preserve the value of the corpus. The Diocese's investment may be redeemed at any time with no prior notice. The Foundation will normally remit funds by month end following a request for redemption. In the event of a total liquidation of the Diocese's investment, the Foundation may hold back a portion of the investment related to alternate investments which may be redeemed quarterly with a 90-day notice.

Note 7 - Note Payable, Related Party

On November 30, 2009, the Corporation made a \$1.3 million property loan to the Camp. The principal on this note is due and payable in annual installment payments in the amount of \$100,000 commencing November 30, 2012 through November 30, 2024. Accrued and unpaid interest of 3% is payable on the last day of each calendar month beginning October 31, 2012. Interest payments to the Corporation are being waived.

Note 8 - Note Payable, Paycheck Protection Program

The Diocese and Camp received loan proceeds in the amount of \$249,900 and \$100,400, respectively, under the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP). The loans have maturity dates of May 4, 2022 and April 15, 2022, respectively, and interest rates of 1%. Principal and interest payments were deferred on both loans in 2020. The PPP, established as part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act (CARES Act), provides for loans to qualifying businesses for amounts up to 2.5 times of the average monthly payroll expenses of the qualifying business. The loans and accrued interest are forgivable after 24 weeks as long as the borrower uses the loan proceeds for eligible purposes, including payroll, benefits, rent and utilities, and maintains is payroll levels. Under the I as Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act, Section 1102, Paycheck Protection Program the Small Business Administration (SBA) has five years to audit any applicant. The Diocese, at the time of submitting its application, evaluated the economic uncertainty resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic and the potential impact of that uncertainty on the ongoing operations of the business. Based on the risk of the Diocese having to limit or close its operations and unavailability of other sources of liquidity it was determined that the loan request was necessary.

Note 9 - Employee Retirement Benefits

The Diocese of Dallas contributes to a retirement plan for clergy employed by the Diocesan office, which is maintained and administered by the Church Pension Group of the Episcopal Church (CPG). The Diocese makes annual contributions to the fund equal to 18% of compensation. Total contributions for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019 were approximately \$71,538 and \$82,000, respectively.

The Diocese contributes to another retirement plan for lay employees. This plan is maintained and administered by the CPG. The Diocese makes annual contributions to the fund equal to 10% of employee compensation. Total contributions for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019 were approximately \$50,885 and \$49,000, respectively.

The Diocese contributes to another retirement plan for employees of the Camp. This plan is maintained and administered by the CPG. The Camp makes annual contributions to the fund up to 10% of Camp employee compensation. The Diocese contributes 9% of the Camp's Executive Director's compensation and housing to another retirement plan administered by CPG. Total contributions for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019 were approximately \$21,000 and \$30,000, respectively.

The Diocese also has a postretirement noncontributory Medicare Supplement Plan that covers laity employees who meet certain eligibility requirements. The Diocese paid approximately \$44,400 and \$44,400 for retiree Medicare Supplement premiums for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019, respectively.

Note 11 - Endowment Funds

The Diocese's endowment funds consist of approximately six funds, including the EOE, established for a variety of purposes. The endowment funds include both donor-restricted endowment funds and funds designated by the Executive Council to function as endowment. As required by U.S. GAAP, net assets associated with endowment funds, including funds designated by the Executive Council to function as endowments, are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

Note 11 - Endowment Funds (continued)

The Diocese has interpreted Texas State Law as requiring it to periodically evaluate the amounts to be preserved as permanently restricted funds for those donor restricted endowment funds subject to Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA). In making such evaluation, the Diocese considers such factors as (a) the duration and permanence of the fund, giving priority to the donor's intent that the fund be maintained permanently; (b) the purposes of the Diocese and the fund; (c) general economic conditions; (d) the possible effects of inflation and deflation; (e) the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments; (f) other resources of the Diocese; and (g) the investment policy of the Diocese.

Investment Objectives and Spending Policy

The Diocese's investment objective is to earn inflation-offsetting returns that preserve the real value of the assets and, where possible, earn enhanced returns to achieve the spending objectives of the programs supported by the endowments. Endowment assets include donor-restricted funds that the Diocese must hold in perpetuity as well as board-designated funds. The endowment assets are invested in a diversified investment portfolio designed to achieve a balance of income and growth objectives within prudent risk constraints.

After maintaining the real value of the permanent endowment funds, any remainder of total return is available for appropriation. State law allows the Diocese to appropriate so much of net appreciation as is prudent considering the Diocese's long-term and short-term needs, present and anticipated financial requirements, and expected total return on its investments, price level trends, and general economic conditions.

From time to time, the fair value of assets associated with individual donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the level the donor or UPMIFA requires the Diocese to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. As of December 31, 2020 and 2019, there were no deficiencies.

Note 12 – Concentrations of Risk

Two parishes comprise approximately 40% and 39% of total assessments received by the Diocese for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019, respectively. The Diocese had cash deposits with financial institutions that exceeded the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation insured limit at various times during the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019.

Note 13 - Related Party Activity

The Diocese offices in a building owned by the Corporation. The Corporation does not charge the Diocese for the use of these facilities.


Note 14 - Commitments and Contingencies

The Diocese guarantees a loan provided to a church for the cost of construction of certain property improvements. The total committed and outstanding loan balance was \$2,861,576 as of December 31, 2020 and 2019. The Diocese has no liability recorded in relation to the loan guarantee as of December 31, 2020 and 2019 as the loan has not been called.

The Diocese is party to various claims and complaints arising in the normal course of operations. In the opinion of management, all such matters are without merit, and an unfavorable disposition would not have a material effect on the financial position of the Diocese. Furthermore, the Diocese anticipates no losses due to environmental issues or hazardous employee working conditions.

Note 15 - Subsequent Events

In preparing the accompanying consolidated financial statements, the Diocese has reviewed events that have occurred after December 31, 2020 through October 4, 2021, the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued. On March 17, 2021 and July 16, 2021, the entire PPP loan balances for Diocese and Camp were forgiven, respectively.
